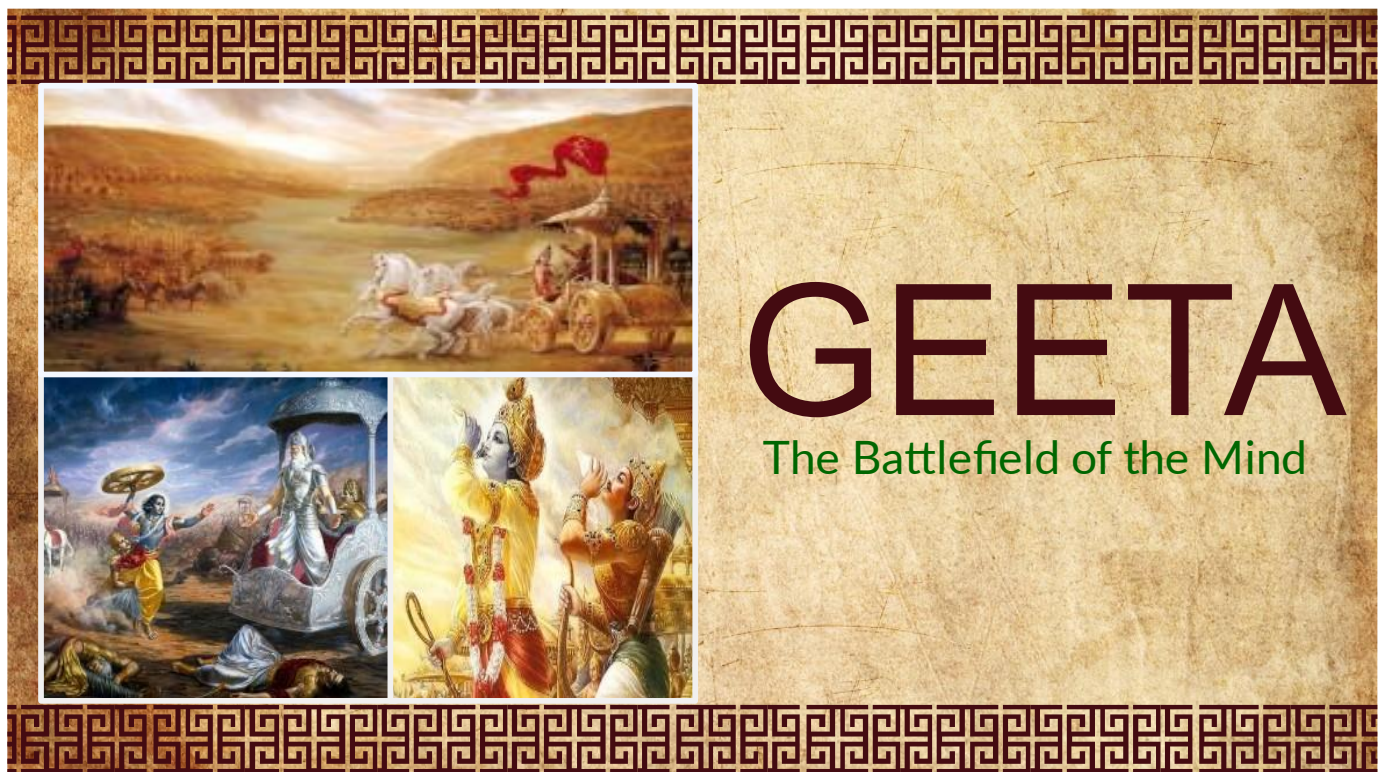
"Leadership from an Eastern Perspective"

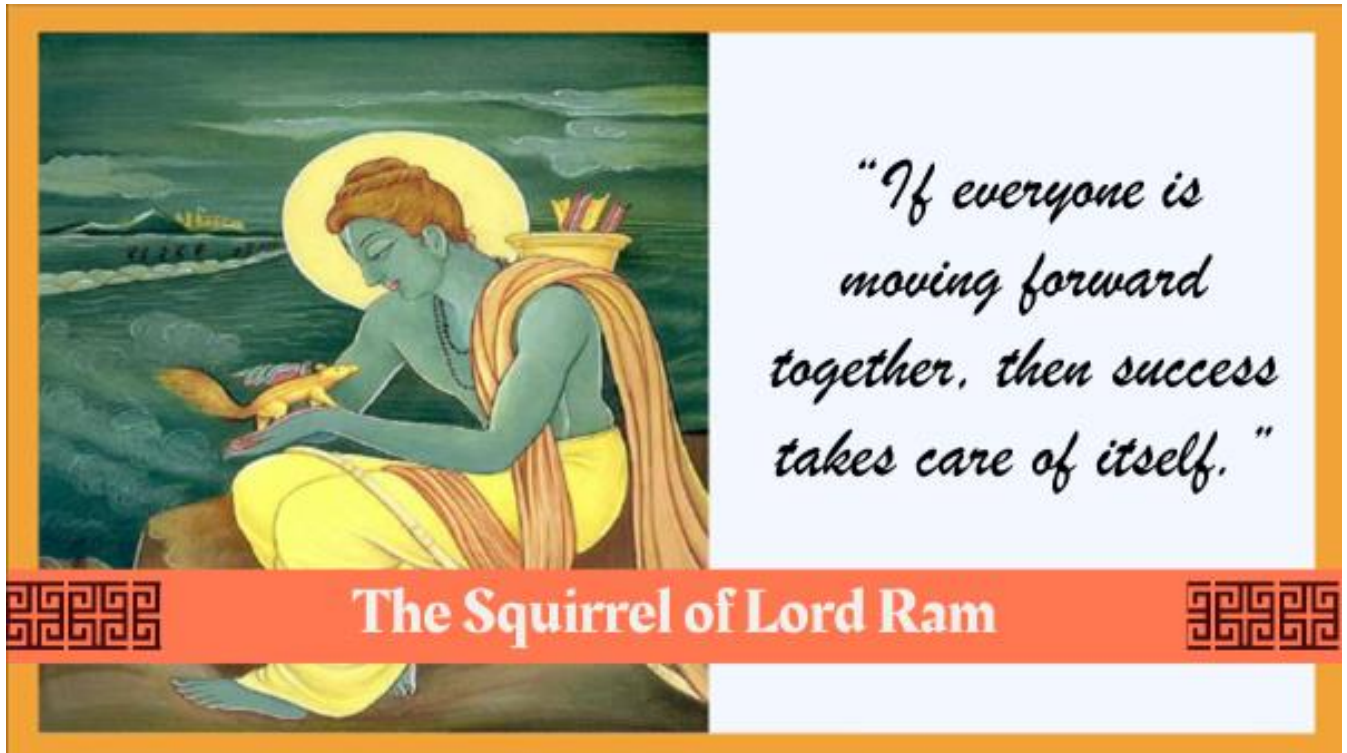
ASCETIC KING

Moving forward with the lecture, Dr. Anupama told the story of Lord Rama and the squirrel and how the squirrel got the white stripes on its back, No task and service to Sri Rama, however small, is unimportant! Every task should be looked upon as service to the Lord, and his blessings will always be with us. We should never forget that love and dedication matter to Lord Rama, not extensive services and show we make for our prestige.

The next lesson was the story of Lord Krishna and the peacock, a very beautiful tale of total devotion to the lord. This story shows how we should offer the best thing we have to Krishna. Not just things we don't need. Also, this is a story of appreciation. When we get something from others, we should be very thankful, even if it is insignificant. It is a sign of love and therefore has excellent value. Krishna has put on his head plumage from peacocks to show his gratitude for the service they have done for him by dancing.

Dr. Anupama brought forward four leadership lessons that we can learn from Lord Rama. The lessons are: -

1. A leader must possess clear vision
2. A leader must have the ability to organise the given resources productively
3. A leader must be a team player
4. A leader must have an unyielding belief in one's team



Moving forward with the lecture, Dr. Anupama also told the gathering the story of Harishchandra and the great warrior Karna. Through the story, a fundamental lesson of truth and self-sacrifice as the only true path towards leadership and self-awakening was taught to the students. Political giants such as former Indian President Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam and current Prime Minister of India Narendra Modi also lead the vanguard of leadership in the modern world. Their leadership qualities are known all over the globe.

Coming to the contemporary time, Dr. Anupama highlighted five pivotal lessons on leadership which can be learned from the business tycoon and emissary of philanthropy, Ratan Tata. The lessons are: -

2. Leaders are characterized by humility

3. Leaders must be innovators
4. Leaders must take learn from criticism
5. Leaders should possess the courage to take risks

“Growth is painful. Change is painful. But nothing is as painful as staying stuck where you do not belong.”

“It’s very important to learn quick lessons from your failures, very important to recognise symptoms of failure pretty early, and it is very, very important to not to be attached too much to the idea – you have to know when to give up an idea.”

In the conclusion, Dr. Anupama accentuated the essential lessons on leadership by none other than the biggest industrialist of India, Mukesh Ambani. The lessons are: -

1. Asking the right questions

2. Adapting to changing time
3. Living with a mission in life.

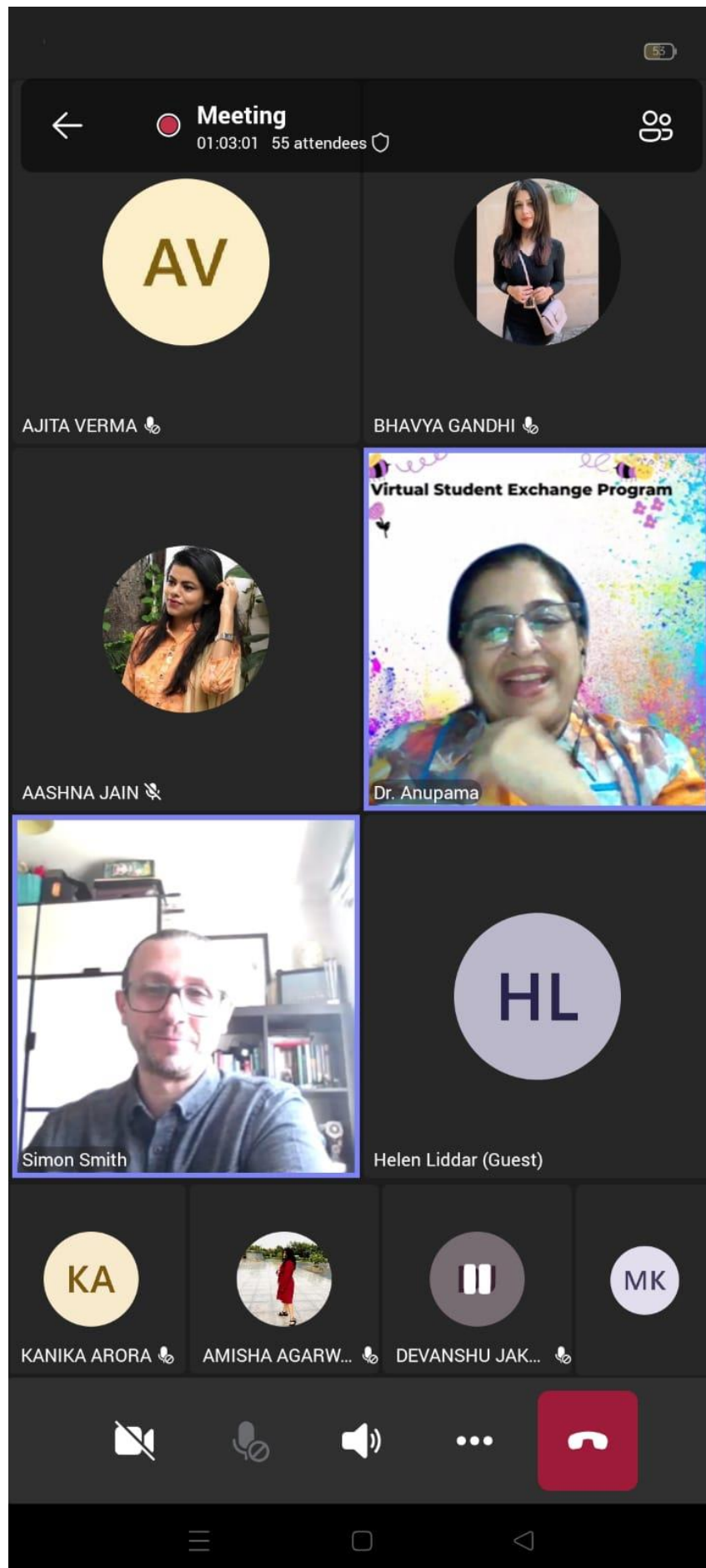
