31 Code of ethics for research followed by the departments

Response:

a) The Institution follows the University Guideline G-53 (University Research Policy Guidelines) and G-58 (Policy Guidelines for Publication and Presentation of Research at Symposia/Meetings/Conferences)

Ethical Clearance should be obtained from the Institutional Ethics Committee (IEC) if the proposal involves research on human participants. Ethics committee approval should be obtained before beginning the research work. Ethics committee approval is needed for all kinds of biomedical research involving human participants or their samples or stored data/ clinical records. Research should not be done if ethics committee has not given the clearance.

The composition of ethics committee is as per ICMR Ethical Guidelines. The IECs should be multidisciplinary and multi-sectorial in composition. Independence and competence are the two hallmarks of an IEC. The number of persons in an ethics committee should be kept fairly small (8 - 12 members). It is generally accepted that a minimum of five persons is required to form the quorum without which a decision regarding the research should not be taken. The IEC should appoint from among its members a Chairman who should be from outside the Institution and not head of the same Institution to maintain the independence of the Committee. The Member Secretary should be from the same Institution and should conduct the business of the Committee. Other members should be a mix of medical/ non-medical, scientific and non-scientific persons including lay persons to represent the differed points of view. The composition may be as follows:-

- 1. Chairperson, 2. One two persons from basic medical science area, 3. One two clinicians from various Institutes, 4. One legal expert or retired judge, 5. One social scientist/ representative of non-governmental voluntary agency, 6. One philosopher/ ethicist/ theologian, 7. One lay person from the community, 8. Member Secretary
- b) There is an established University/institutional ethics committee which screens various projects/proposals related to human samples/ animals and ensures that appropriate measures should be taken during handling of animals or processing of samples. We also strictly follow plagiarism policy of the university by using software 'Turnitin'.

The assessment plan includes:

- 2. **Objectives**: Every programme has objectives defined in line with the institution and domain goals under the following categories:
 - (a) Programme Educational objectives (PEO)
 - (b) Programme Operational objectives (POO)
- 3. **Outcomes**: The outcomes of every programme are categorised as:
 - (a) Programme Learning outcomes (PLO)

Mapping of PEOs with PLOs: The relationship of PEOs and PLOs are clearly indicated through the mapping of learning outcomes with educational objectives. Each outcome addresses one or more objectives. Outcomes are assessed and achievement of an outcome indicates attainment of the objective.

Assessment of Learning and Operational Outcomes: Each learning outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect tool. Some examples of direct tools are comprehensive exam, dissertation report rubrics, communication skills rubrics, behavioural science rubrics etc. Indirect assessment tools include student exit survey, alumni survey, feedback of industry internship guide etc. Similarly, operational outcomes are also assessed using operational assessment tools such as



student feedback of course faculty, plagiarism check of internship/dissertation reports etc. All the above mentioned tools are developed by the programme review committee (PRC) and implemented by the programme outcome assessment committee (POAC).

50 Briefly highlight the contributions of the department in generating new knowledge, basic or applied:

Response:

Faculty at AIA work at the community level carrying out research on all aspects of humankind. At AIA various research works related to tribes and other population are conducted with very good outcome for policy planning and implementation.

The project 'Health and Family Welfare Infrastructure (Private and Public Sector) in East Khasi Hills (Meghalaya) Focusing on Abortion', was sponsored by Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (Project Director: Dr. Roumi Deb). It was conducted in thirty-five villages from all the seven blocks of East Khasi Hill district of Meghalaya. The data collection was on the various health aspects related to women and children in the community.

The project Demographic and genetic studies related to the incidence of Neural Tube Defects (NTDs)' was sponsored by 'Indian Council of Medical Research' (Project Director: Dr. Roumi Deb). This project aimed to assess the role of hyperthermia, drug exposure and chronic illness of the mother during pregnancy behind the Neural Tube Defect child. Besides to study the role of PAX-1, 3, 7 & 9 genes in the incidence of Neural Tube Defect and to screen the mothers of Neural Tube Defects and the control mothers for MTHFR C677T polymorphism. Project Director: Dr. Roumi Deb.

A study of Migrant women in the Informal Sector of Delhi Regions funded by ICSSR (PI- Prof. Roumi Deb). This study documents migrant women's experiences of living in the city and working in the informal sector. Carried out for six months in slum settlements in Delhi, the objective was to understand, through women's eyes, the processes of migration to the city, finding work, setting up a home and building a new life. This study documents the fact that women are migrating in search of livelihood, that women are important economic agents in this process.

Prevalence and Risk Factors leading to HIV Infection Among the Two Tribes of Jaintia Hills, Meghalaya (PI- Prof. Roumi Deb). Present study clearly indicates that HIV is prevalent (4.92%) in almost all parts of the Jaintia Hills, Meghalaya. More numbers of women are infected with HIV in comparison to their male counterparts and the main mode of transmission is mostly sexual transmission. Study reveals that due to lack of knowledge regarding HIV/AIDS, illiteracy youths are not able to access the prevention services. There are no HIV/ AIDS prevention programmes or activities sponsored by local mosque or churches in the study area. Awareness programme regarding various aspects of HIV/AIDS was conducted among the youths of Jaintia Hills through HIV/AIDS Awareness Programme, focus group discussion at the school, college, community level under the present study.

Ovarian Cancer screening is being carried out under a DBT sanctioned Project in the Malwa region of



Punjab, where the women are screened for carcinoma in the ovaries. If found, follow up of these women is done where they are referred to a gynoalecologit for further assessment. Also, pesticide detection is being carried out in the blood samples of these women in order to understand its role in cancer causation.

HIV screening is being carried out at mass level under DST funded project among the Tangkhul Naga of Manipur. It was observed that the Tangkhul's which a very sensitive tribe with less awareness still live with prejudice and stigma against HIV/AIDS which acts as a huge barrier in availing medical services as well as hampers proper administration of measures and implementations programs. In

such sensitive scenario, acquiring the accurate rate of HIV prevalence becomes impossible. People do not come forward for blood screening, and HIV/AIDS infection is still kept in hush.

Response:

AIB follows code of ethics as per Guidelines 53 & 58 by Amity University, Uttar Pradesh.

The institution also follows the Bio safety, Ethical and animal ethical committee guidelines, details are as under:

AIB carries out research in accordance with guidelines laid down by university. All procedures have been screened by the biosafety committee of the institution.

- (a) Research policy: All faculty members of AIB are expected to undertake research activities in addition to their teaching and administrative responsibilities and should seek funding resources for the same, where appropriate. All research activities should be undertaken in compliance of the University's obligations under legislation and in accordance with regulatory and ethical considerations.
- (b) Publication and Presentation Policy: To maintain the ethical standards while publication of any research material, the following have to be adhered to:
- (i) Originality: All research material originating from Amity should be original and not plagiarized from any source. To ensure the same, all research material to be sent for publication should be checked for originality using appropriate plagiarism software that will be provided by the University to all its faculty, staff and students. The University may establish a central mechanism for checking Plagiarism for publication of PhD Thesis, Research papers, conference presentations etc.
- (ii) Authenticity: It will be the responsibility of the researchers (faculty/staff/students) to ensure that all the results of their research that are to be published in any form are authentic, not manipulated in any form and can be reproduced under the conditions so defined by the researcher.
- (iii) Authorship: It is the responsibility of the corresponding author in the group to ensure that due credit is given to individuals involved in the research activity, even if they are no longer associated with Amity University when the research work is sent for publication. The role played by each individual for generation of the specific research findings being considered for publication must be clearly defined. The list of authors should accurately include individuals who have: G-58 5 Substantial contributions to conceptualization and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; Drafting/Revising the article for important intellectual content; and Preparation of the final version of the article to be published. Further, it has to be ensured that persons are not provided undue credit during publication of research in which they have not been involved. Any disputes regarding authorship should be brought to the notice of the concerned Directorate, which will resolve such issues in a timely manner after considering the views of the aggrieved parties. The decision of the Directorate in this regard will be final and deemed to be binding to all the



concerned parties. Any disputes of authorship arising after publication will be evaluated and looked into by the University DSI with immediate effect. The correction will be published if deemed appropriate.

- (iv) Acknowledgments: All individuals, organizations and funding sources that have facilitated the conduct of research by providing infrastructure, intellectual, financial, secretarial and other forms of support must be acknowledged in publication of all research material. All articles should be communicated for publication following intimation to the Head of Department/Institution and the Directorate. It will be the responsibility of the researcher to ensure originality and authenticity of work submitted, appropriate inclusion of researchers as authors/co-authors, acknowledgements, and to regularly provide status updates to HOD/HOI and the Directorate regarding the status of any publication.
- (c) Bio Safety Committee of Amity University, AUUP- IBSC of AUUP conduct onsite evaluation, assessment and monitoring of adherence to the biosafety guidelines with overall oversight of the regulatory process, at the institutional level. IBSC have expertise in evaluation, assessment and monitoring of projects and ensure compliance with the Rules, 1989, Recombinant DNA (rDNA) Safety Guidelines,1990 and other guidelines issued by DBT from time to time.
- (d) AIB carries out research in accordance with guidelines laid down by IEC/IC-SCR/DCGI. All projects containing human samples are evaluated by the Committee and after getting clearance from the Committee are being executed by the faculty members and Research Scholars.
- (e) AIB carries out research in animal models and all proposals are first submitted to Instuitional Animal Ethics Committee and after getting due approval the animals are used with professional ethics

- (iii) Authorship: It is the responsibility of the communicating author in the group to ensure that due credit is given to individuals involved in the research activity, even if they are no longer associated with Amity when the research work is sent for publication. The role played by each individual for generation of the specific research findings being considered for publication must be clearly defined. The list of authors should accurately include individuals who have: Substantial contributions to conceptualization and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; Drafting/Revising the article for important intellectual content.
 - Further, it has to be ensured that persons are not provided undue credit during publication of research in which they have not been involved. Any disputes regarding authorship should be brought to the notice of the concerned Directorate to resolve such issues in a timely manner considering the views of the aggrieved parties. The decision of the Directorate will be final and deemed to be binding to all the concerned parties.
 - Any disputes of authorship arising after publication will be evaluated and looked into by the University DSI with immediate effect.



(iv) Acknowledgments: All individuals, organizations and funding sources that have facilitated the conduct of research by providing infrastructure, intellectual, financial, secretarial and other forms of support must be acknowledged in publication of all research material. All articles should be communicated for publication following intimation to the Head of Department/Institution and the Directorate.

- 2. **Objectives**: Every programme has objectives defined in line with the institution and domain goals under the following categories:

 - (b) Programme Operational objectives (POO)
- 3. **Outcomes**: The outcomes of every programme are categorised as:
 - (a) Programme Learning outcomes (PLO)

Mapping of PEOs with PLOs: The relationship of PEOs and PLOs are clearly indicated through the mapping of learning outcomes with educational objectives. Each outcome addresses one or more objectives. Outcomes are assessed and achievement of an outcome indicates attainment of the objective.

Assessment of Learning and Operational Outcomes: Each learning outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect tool. Some examples of direct tools are comprehensive exam, dissertation report rubrics, communication skills rubrics, behavioural science rubrics etc. Indirect assessment tools include student exit survey, alumni survey, feedback of industry internship guide etc. Similarly, operational outcomes are also assessed using operational assessment tools such as student feedback of course faculty, plagiarism check of internship/dissertation reports etc. All the above mentioned tools are developed by the programme review committee (PRC) and implemented by the programme outcome assessment committee (POAC).

Research policy:

All faculty members of Amity are expected to undertake research activities in addition to their teaching and administrative responsibilities, and should seek funding resources for the same,



where appropriate. All research activities should be undertaken in compliance of the University's obligations under legislation, and in accordance with regulatory and ethical considerations.

Publication and Presentation Policy:

To maintain the highest ethical standards while publication of any research material, the following have to be adhered to: (i) Originality: All research material originating from Amity should be original and not plagiarized from any source. To ensure the same, all research material to be sent for publication should be checked for originality using appropriate plagiarism software that will be provided by the University to all its faculty, staff and students. The University may establish a central mechanism for checking Plagiarism for publication of PhD Thesis, Research papers, conference presentations etc. (ii) Authenticity: It will be the responsibility of the researchers (faculty/staff/students) to ensure that all the results of their research that are to be published in any form are authentic, not manipulated in any form and can be reproduced under the conditions so defined by the researcher. (iii) Authorship: It is the responsibility of the senior researcher in the group to ensure that due credit is given to individuals involved in the research activity, even if they are no longer associated with Amity when the research work is sent for publication. The role played by each individual for generation of the specific research findings being considered for publication must be clearly defined. The list of authors should accurately include individuals who have: G-58 5 • Substantial contributions to conceptualization and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; • Drafting/Revising the article for important intellectual content; and • Preparation of the final version of the article to be published. Further, it has to be ensured that persons are not provided undue credit during publication of research in which they have not been involved. Any disputes regarding authorship should be brought to the notice of the concerned Directorate, which will resolve such issues in a timely manner after considering the views of the aggrieved parties. The decision of the Directorate in this regard will be final and deemed to be binding to all the concerned parties. Any disputes of authorship arising after publication will be evaluated and looked into by the University DSI with immediate effect. The correction will be published if deemed appropriate. (iv) Acknowledgments: All individuals, organizations and funding sources that have facilitated the conduct of research by providing infrastructure, intellectual, financial, secretarial and other forms of support must be acknowledged in publication of all research material. All articles should be communicated for publication following intimation to the Head of Department/Institution and the Directorate . It will be the responsibility of the researcher to ensure originality and authenticity of work submitted, appropriate inclusion of researchers as authors/coauthors, acknowledgements, and to regularly provide status updates to HOD/HOI and the Directorate regarding the status of any publication.

AIMT carries out research in accordance with guidelines laid down by university. All procedures have been screened by the biosafety committee of the institution. Research policy:

All faculty members of AIMT are expected to undertake research activities in addition to their teaching and administrative responsibilities, and should seek funding resources for the same, where appropriate. All research activities should be undertaken in compliance of the University's obligations under legislation, and in accordance with regulatory and ethical considerations.

Publication and Presentation Policy:



To maintain the highest ethical standards while publication of any research material, the following have to be adhered to: (i) Originality: All research material originating from Amity should be original and not plagiarized from any source. To ensure the same, all research material to be sent for publication should be checked for originality using appropriate plagiarism software that will be provided by the University to all its faculty, staff and students. The University may establish a central mechanism for checking Plagiarism for publication of PhD Thesis, Research papers, conference presentations etc. (ii) Authenticity: It will be the responsibility of the researchers (faculty/staff/students) to ensure that all the results of their research that are to be published in any form are authentic, not manipulated in any form and can be reproduced under the conditions so defined by the researcher. (iii) Authorship: It is the responsibility of the senior researcher in the group to ensure that due credit is given to individuals involved in the research activity, even if they are no longer associated with Amity when the research work is sent for publication. The role played by each individual for generation of the specific research findings being considered for publication must be clearly defined. The list of authors should accurately include individuals who have: G-58 5 • Substantial contributions to conceptualization and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; • Drafting/Revising the article for important intellectual content; and • Preparation of the final version of the article to be published. Further, it has to be ensured that persons are not provided undue credit during publication of research in which they have not been involved. Any disputes regarding authorship should be brought to the notice of the concerned Directorate, which will resolve such issues in a timely manner after considering the views of the aggrieved parties. The decision of the Directorate in this regard will be final and deemed to be binding to all the concerned parties. Any disputes of authorship arising after publication will be evaluated and looked into by the University DSI with immediate effect. The correction will be published if deemed appropriate. (iv) Acknowledgments: All individuals, organizations and funding sources that have facilitated the conduct of research by providing infrastructure, intellectual, financial, secretarial and other forms of support must be acknowledged in publication of all research material. All articles should be communicated for publication following intimation to the Head of Department/Institution and the Directorate . It will be the responsibility of the researcher to ensure originality and authenticity of work submitted, appropriate inclusion of researchers as authors/coauthors, acknowledgements, and to regularly provide status updates to HOD/HOI and the Directorate regarding the status of any publication.

Outcome assessment is a systematic evaluative process that is implemented to secure learning experiences that are congruent with the original goals and objectives, thereby providing a basis for effective and continuous quality improvement of the academic unit.

The assessment plan includes:

Assessment of Learning and Operational Outcomes: Each learning outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect tool. Institute in last five years has successfully transferred technology of a novel root endophyte formulation i.e. 'Rootonic' to MS. Krauter Health Care Pvt. Ltd. By transferring consortia of seven patents for a sum of Rs. 50 Lakhs. This technology is being now rigorously tested in field under DBT-SIBRI project and the results are very positive.

Scientists from the institute have also recently filed a patent for a novel plant promoting endophytic fungus which will have a very positive impact on agriculture in future.

Institute has developed model framework of BSc and MSc programs and provided flexibility.

Program review committee implemented from 2014.

Development of framework for comprehensive exam, rubrics, and exit survey.

Publication and Presentation Policy:

To maintain the highest ethical standards while publication of any research material, the following have to be adhered to: (i) Originality: All research material originating from Amity should be original and not plagiarized from any source. To ensure the same, all research material to be sent for publication should be checked for originality using appropriate plagiarism software that will be provided by the University to all its faculty, staff and students. The University may establish a central mechanism for checking Plagiarism for publication of PhD Thesis, Research papers, conference presentations etc. (ii) Authenticity: It will be the responsibility of the researchers (faculty/staff/students) to ensure that all the results of their research that are to be published in any form are authentic, not manipulated in any form and can be reproduced under the conditions so defined by the researcher. (iii) Authorship: It is the responsibility of the senior researcher in the group to ensure that due credit is given to individuals involved in the research activity, even if they are no longer associated with Amity when the research work is sent for publication. The role played by each individual for generation of the specific research findings being considered for publication must be clearly defined. The list of authors should accurately include individuals who have: G-58 5 • Substantial contributions to conceptualization and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; • Drafting/Revising the article for important intellectual content; and • Preparation of the final version of the article to be published. Further, it has to be ensured that persons are not provided undue credit during publication of research in which they have not been involved. Any disputes regarding authorship should be brought to the notice of the concerned Directorate, which will resolve such issues in a timely manner after considering the views of the aggrieved parties. The decision of the Directorate in this regard will be final and deemed to be binding to all the concerned parties. Any disputes of authorship arising after publication will be evaluated and looked into by the University DSI with immediate effect. The correction will be published if deemed appropriate. (iv) Acknowledgments: All individuals, organizations and funding sources that have facilitated the conduct of research by providing infrastructure, intellectual, financial, secretarial and other forms of support must be acknowledged in publication of all research material. All articles should be communicated for publication following intimation to the Head of Department/Institution and the Directorate. It will be the responsibility of the researcher to ensure originality and authenticity of work submitted, appropriate inclusion of researchers as authors/coauthors, acknowledgements, and to regularly provide status updates to HOD/HOI and the Directorate regarding the status of any publication.



Response:

Blended Learning – Through this approach the course content is delivered via digital and online media with some element of student control over time, place, path, or pace.

Case Based Learning – The cases related to the course are used to challenge students to use problem solving techniques, self-learning, team participation skills, and disciplinary knowledge.

Cooperative Learning – The projects given to the students are aimed to catalyse academic and social learning experiences.

Field Based Learning – Specific courses involve course work which takes place outside the classroom such as visiting the factory to observe the manufacturing process, visiting the various retailers in mall and learn about visual merchandizing, etc.

Inquiry Based Learning – The facilitator provides questions, problems or scenarios to the students in form of projects or cases which help the students determine the ideal solutions for the practical problems faced by businesses.

Problem Based Learning - The students are encouraged to learn about a subject/ course through the experience of solving an open-ended problem.

Community Service Learning – Through the Value Added Courses, the students are motivated to undertake community service.

Experiential Learning – The learning techniques involving reflection by doing help bridge the gap between classroom learning and practical business requirements.



The learning outcome assessment monitoring is more qualitative and focuses on improving teaching methods by analyzing student learning outcomes.

Quantitative approach is followed for doing the review of the program/discipline as a whole, assessing its effectiveness, relevance and student learning.



The learning outcome monitoring include aligning of domain mission to institutional mission and finally to the program objective. These broad goals are categorized in two categories namely educational goal and operational goal.

Mapping of Program Educational Objectives (PEOs) and Program Learning Outcome (PLOs):

PEOs and PLOs are linked through mapping of learning outcomes with established objectives. Each outcome have an objective and achievement of the outcome indicates the attainment of the said objective.

Assessment of learning outcomes:

Each outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect method of evaluation. It is ensured that the outcome achieved is consistent with the objective and thereby with the mission at the institutional and domain level.

The result of the annual assessment and other relevant data are used to determine the effectiveness of the program during assessment of the learning outcomes.

Program Review:

Through program review we assess and overview the following criteria:

- Students are learning the knowledge, skills and habits necessary to achieve program goals and objectives
- The program goals are derived from the institution's mission.
- The curriculum is coherent, current and consistent.
- The instruction is acting as enabler to the students.
- The requisite resources are adequate for student learning
- The academic support services are adequate to facilitate student learning

The launch of Amity Institute of Public Policy (AIPP) was the result of deliberations of Think Tank in Amity University involving over 20 senior academicians, professionals and academic administrators. The Think Tank members met couple of times over a period of two months deliberating on the need of starting Masters Program in Public Policy as a niche program inspired by the series of new initiatives undertaken by the Government of India. Dismantling of Planning Commission and setting up of NITI Aayog has also added new dimension in the field of Public Policy, paving the way for greater consultation. This has also lead to need for creation of new professionals dealing with various aspects of Policy making. The presentation was made on the present capacity in the country to create Public Policy professionals and also the programs offered by top educational institutions in the world in the field of Public Policy. Discussions were held with outside academia, Think Tanks, bureaucrats, Chambers of Commerce like, CII, FICCI, ASSOCHAM to understand the country's need to produce Public Policy Professionals.

It has been noted that while Public Policy is a complex and seamless program touching upon every domain of academics and professional practices, the Program MA (Public Policy & Governance) in Amity Institute of Public Policy was primarily intended to build professionals with more focus in the area of economics, public finance, social welfare, international relations and globalization, broadening the scope for the students of all background, making it a unique program in the country which has attracted the attention of many stakeholders including students from countries like Afghanistan, China and others.

2	Since the country has not provided any Public Policy professionals through the university programmes this is a new emerging field which is likely to face many hurdles and challenges as the resources are limited in this field.
3	The Public Policy professionals need a good number of think tanks for their professional growth which is currently not upto the mark. The culture of think tank participation in India's Policy making process is in the stage of infantry unlike many other countries like U.S where Public Policy professionals and think tanks play a major role on policy framing.
4	In India the policy research is not fully integrated with academics for the reasons stated over.
5	The student's community is yet to understand the essence of public policy as in India's political system and in the system of governance the public policy professionals play a very limited role.

Research work taken by students and faculty are focused towards generating new knowledge in clinical domain, new intervention or exploring the level of efficacy/effectiveness of already known interventions etc. The discussion that are held in Case Conferences and Psychotherapeutic meetings at the Department level also steered towards this end - generating new knowledge or new way of handling a symptom or syndrome, employing new intervention technique/s.

51 Detail five major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the department.

#	Strengths
1	Faculty members are clinically oriented and focused on imparting hands-on professional clinical training following prescribed code of conduct and ethical guidelines.
2	AIBHAS runs all its clinical programs in collaboration with several highly reputed service centres that ensures the availability of a variety of cases for comprehensive clinical training.
3	The Centre offers Professional training at all level - 1 - 4 yr. duration and Ph.D. in Clinical
	Psychology part time basis for those who have already completed the professional training and Registered with RCI. This allows lots of flexibility for trainees to choose their professional path and career goal.
4	AIBHAS being a part of large university campus with international reputation attracts a large number of cognitively resourceful and highly motivated students from all over the Country. This gives the department a unique advantage over other centres in selecting bright and highly committed students for the training program.
5	AIBHAS programs are supported with well-equipped library, and unlimited wifi connectivity for cutting edge research and implementing evidence-based interventions.
#	Weaknesses
1	University does not have its own hospital setup, hence dependency on other service centers.
2	Since faculty members are recruited in accordance with RCI stipulation, per program, no surplus hands for undertaking long-term funded research project.
3	Scope for outreach camp and community mental health programs is limited by the fact AIBHAS doesn't have its own hospital with inpatient and outpatient facilities.
4	Similarly, institute is handicapped in initiating chronic mental health care and rehabilitation of long-term mentally ill.
5	Due to high priority for tertiary care, the primary and secondary interventions involving the school, community etc. are carried out very minimal.
#	Opportunities
1	With the proposed new Doctoral program the faculty members may have some breathing time from clinical supervision of the trainees which they can invest in writing research project for funding etc. thereby help overcoming one of the shortcomings of the center.
2	AIBHAS is provided with an excellent physical infrastructure close to a popular General Hospital to develop it as Centre of Psychological and Rehabilitation services. Consultation and other services have already been started at this centre. If it picks up as a full-fledged mental and rehabilitation institute, the present dependency on other centres for imparting hands-on clinical training may be reduced.
3	Since many motivated students are denied admission because of limited seats, the institute has an opportunity to expand its clinical base and case load, and seek RCI's approval for higher intake. This not only fulfils the local demand for professional training but also contribute greatly for human resource development in the mental health area.



4	Work towards establishing liaison with Primary Health Care Department of General Hospital in order
	to enhance professional contributions in the areas of Behavioural Medicine, Neuro-rehabilitation and
	other speciality services.
5	School mental health program could be undertaken by the institute to train the teachers in recognizing
	and intervening with problem behaviours of children, and training professional students in primary

#	Challenges
1	Integrating academic and clinical input under current Liaison model is one of the challenges faced by
1	the institute.
2	Getting senior faculty members with the stipulated qualification and experience to sustain the clinical
	program is yet another challenge. Since many trained personnel prefer to move into private practice
	or work in corporate hospitals, availability of trained professionals to work in academic settings is
	sparse.
3	Since the institute imparts clinical training in borrowed settings, on which there is no administrative
	control, the flexibility in implementing and conducting various academic activities is minimal.
4	Since the centre doesn't have its own setup the quality control and quality check are limited. This in
	long-term may serve as serious limitation.
5	Since most centres in this part of the country prefer to treat patients on outdoor basis, attrition rate is
	very high. This can be a serious problem in imparting training in comprehensive intervention.
