These events have helped students gain knowledge and awareness about their own field and helped create awareness about many social issues and helped them become better scholars and effective members of the society.

### 45. List the teaching methods adopted by the faculty for different programmes.

#### **Response**;

The thrust of the institute is on experiential learning. Experiential education emphasizes guided activity as a



primary mode of learning. By exposing students to unfamiliar tasks and environments, experiential learning encourages mental and emotional adjustments and promotes the development of new skills and attitudes. It has as a principal goal on the creation of sense of achievement, personal competence, and self-reliance.

Following methods have been adopted by the faculty of AIBAS:

*Blended Learning:* A portion of the traditional face-to-face instruction is replaced by web-based online *learning*. One of the key components of blended learning is to identify what is already working well in the classroom, and what might be better suited as digital content. Faculty is adding digital content; it doesn't mean throwing out all the direct instruction in the classroom. Keep what is working well in a face-to-face mode, and add what could be more effective in a digital format.

Deliverables differed from teacher to teacher depending on the content area. Some teachers overhauled an entire unit of their course, others focused on creating assessments for learning and putting those in place, while others took a more general approach and decided to transition all their handouts into a digital format so they were more accessible.

*Case Based Learning:* Cases are factually-based, complex problems written to stimulate classroom discussion and collaborative analysis. Case teaching involves the interactive, student-centered exploration of realistic and specific situations. As students consider problems from a perspective which requires analysis, they strive to resolve questions that have no single right answer.

*Field-based learning:* Field-based learning extends the walls of the classroom. Students learn from direct experience (such as internships, practicum, and experiential learning) in their major field of study.

*Role-playing:* It refers to the changing of one's behaviour to assume a <u>role</u>, either unconsciously to fill a social role, or consciously to act out an adopted role.

Role-playing may also refer to role <u>training</u> where people <u>rehearse</u> situations in preparation for a future performance and to improve their abilities within a role.

Mock counselling sessions and ICT based learning have also been practised in the department.

We prepare our students academically and professionally for becoming potential employees in immediate future which has also been substantiated by the placement records of our alumni. The student feedback of this teaching methodology has constantly provided the department further directions in improving the education and training provided in the department. The exposure in form of internships, field visits, mock sessions etc. has been valued by the students as being the asset of the teaching methodology at AIBAS in comparison to other institutions.

## Response

Extension activity provides a link between the University and the Community. Such activities have been an integral part of Amity University. AIBAS, as a Department of Behavioural Science believes that learning outside the classroom is just as important as learning within the classroom situation, and it is possible to greatly enhance the students' academic performance with additional extension activities. Therefore, in order to create socially sensitive citizens, the department plans and executes the activities through following events:

Field Visits - Field visits are organised for purposes of first-hand observation are most of assigned to discipline of psychology where it is important to build a bridge of relevance between the theoretical concepts learned in the classroom and the practise of actually doing the work the students are being taught to do.

## Undergraduate Programmes

The visits of Undergraduate programs for the period of 4 years focussed on sensitising the students regarding the legal aspect of various psychosocial conflicts along with an exposure on rehabilitation and welfare of Mentally handicapped.

The following field visits have been successfully conducted.

- 1. Visit to Association for Advocacy and Legal Initiatives (AALI)
- 2. Visit to Uttar Pradesh Human Rights Commission UHRC (Office)
- 3. Visit to Prabal De- addiction and Psychiatric Hospital (Rehabilitation centre)
- 4. Visit to Chetna Institute of Mentally Handicapped.

## Post graduate programmes

The visits of Post graduate programs (Masters in Counselling Psychology, Postgraduate diploma in Counselling Psychology, MPhil Child and Adolescent Psychology and PhD) were organised to ensure direct interaction and experience of students with persons with mental illnesses. The aim was to enhance the learning of students from horse's mouth and understand the efforts undertaken by professionals working towards the well-being and rehabilitation of Psychiatric patients as well as patients in General Medical Conditions.



The following field visits have been successfully conducted.

- 1. Visit to Ram Manor Lohia Institute of Medical Sciences
- 2. Visit to Prabal- Deaddiction and Psychiatric Hospital (Rehabilitation Centre)
- 3. Visit to The Richmond Fellowship Society (I), NAv Uday Mansik Swathya Sansthan, Lucknow.
- 4. Visit to Nur-Manzil Psychiatric Centre
- 5. Visit to Chetna Institute of Mentally Handicapped

The field visits thus sensitised the students with hands on interaction with persons with mental illness, and challenges face by them as growing area for concern, difficulties faced by personnel working on such sensitive areas and broadened their horizons for conscientious engagement in society through the knowledge regarding recent legal amendments, initiatives towards human rights of people and especially women, and rehabilitation of persons with psychiatric disabilities.

Internship Programs: A one-month Summer Internship at AIBAS is required for qualifying for a graduate and post graduate degree. It serves as a temporary permission for students to work in organisations with supervision under specific number of academic credits as per university guidelines. The purpose of such internships is to provide the students with direct experience and to be perceived it as a way to develop their capabilities by practically applying their degree while learning in a professional work environment and also to explore their interest in various career option.

All Students have interned during their summer break across India with an exception of internship at UAE. The area of work ranged from Health care sectors like psychiatric centres, rehabilitation centres and General Medical hospitals, Educational Sector such as special schools, as well as Corporate sector. This phase of acquiring knowledge focused for them on observational study and learning soft skills from professionals at the respective organisation. The current Batches of Undergraduate and post graduate programs who are to pass out in 2017 and later will be undergoing their summer internship in near future.

The aim of Extension activities is to gain practical knowledge and ascertain a link between theory and practical. Psychology as a Social Science requires direct interaction with either the providers or the recipients of care in this area of health. Our students have welcomed the extension activities with open arms and have shown youthful enthusiasm towards filed visits and internships. They have interacted with professionals and clients to gain a deeper understanding of their subjects along with developing interest and aptitude towards career options in Psychology. Abnormal Psychology has always been an attractive subject for students thus students tend to pick up internship sites working with psychiatric population, however the Faculties of our department facilitated in broadening the horizons of students in application of psychology in Corporate and Educational Setups. As a department, AIBAS lays foundations for responsible citizens and believes that to acquire knowledge students must study, but to acquire wisdom they must observe.

## 48. Give details of "beyond syllabus scholarly activities" of the department.

## Response;

In Amity Institute of Behavioral and allied Sciences (AIBAS), the students are not only encouraged for the studies but also to go beyond scholarly activities. Overall development of the students in terms of



Knowledge, soft skills and Industry readiness is the focal point of the AIBAS. To incorporate the required skills in the student, various Seminars, conferences, workshops, Industry visits, guest lectures and Club activities are organized wherein the faculty motivates the student to ensure their participation and Experiential learning. The objective is at Amity we are passionate about grooming leaders who are not only thorough professionals but also good human beings with values. The various beyond scholarly activities are:

- 1. Conferences, seminars and workshop: The students are constantly encouraged to make their research paper presentations in various seminars and conferences. Moreover, they all are facilitated to attend the workshops held by the department and outside department both. The objective is to orient students about the recent changes and development so that they can improvise.
- 2. Industry Tour/ Field Visit: The students are frequently exposed to the industrial setup for the implementation of the theoretical knowledge. The objective is to enhance their learning beyond walls of the text books.

## 50. Briefly highlight the contributions of the department in generating new knowledge, basic or applied.

### Response

- AIBAS is continuously working towards the Integration of theoretical and practical knowledge of children by using various teaching methodologies which enhance the knowledge, skill and expertise of children in this area.
- The major projects and dissertations are usually in the field of new research areas like Music Psychology. One of the students has worked under Dr. Durgesh K. Upadhyay on the variables like music preference and music perception and its relation with personality and cognition. A scale on 'Music Preference' has been developed and is in press for the publication.
- AIBAS has done an International conference on HIV/AIDS in 2014 which was an emerging field in the area of Psychology. This year, AIBAS is again organizing an International Conference on Human Behaviour and Development Issue with major theme "*Growth and Sustainability*."
- Domestic Harmony scale has been constructed for the first time in Psychology by one of the Ph.D. students under the supervision of Prof. (Dr.) Manju Agarwal.
- Another Ph.D. student is working on the concept of *flow* and planning intervention strategies for the same under the supervision of Dr. Soni Kewalramani.
- Recently AIBAS has planned and started a study on Aggression in Adolescent in 2015-16 under Centre for Research and Innovation for Adolescents. The purpose is to study aggression in relation to Communication and Relationships. All PG students of AIBAS is working under this project. Later we are planning to design and implement Intervention programmes in order to reduce aggression among adolescents.
- On a regular basis curriculum is updated taken into consideration the industrial requirements, international criteria's, feedback form both industry and students. Besides, we are also organizing workshops for our students in the new areas and fields of therapy like NLP, Hypnotherapy etc.







# 46. How does the department ensure that programme objectives are constantly met and learning outcomes are monitored?

#### **Response:**

At ASET various mechanisms have been adopted to ensure programmes objectives are constantly met and learning outcomes are monitored.

### **Outcome Assessment:**

The learning outcome assessment monitoring is more qualitative and focuses on improving teaching methods by analyzing student learning outcomes.

Quantitative approach is followed for doing the review of the program/discipline as a whole, assessing its effectiveness, relevance and student learning.

The learning outcome monitoring include aligning of domain mission to institutional mission and finally to the program objective. These broad goals are categorized in two categories namely educational goal and operational goal.

# Mapping of Program Educational Objectives (PEOs) and Program Learning Outcome (PLOs):

PEOs and PLOs are linked through mapping of learning outcomes with established objectives. Each outcome has an objective and achievement of the outcome indicates the attainment of the said objective.



### Assessment of learning outcomes:

Each outcome is assessed by atleast one direct and one indirect method of evaluation. It is ensured that the outcome achieved is consistent with the objective and thereby with the mission at the institutional and domain level.

Mapping of Program Educational Objectives (PEOs) and Program Learning Outcome (PLOs): PEOs and PLOs are linked through mapping of learning outcomes with established objectives. Each outcome have an objective and achievement of the outcome indicates the attainment of the said objective.

Assessment of learning outcomes:

Each outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect method of evaluation. It is ensured that the outcome achieved is consistent with the objective and thereby with the mission at the institutional and domain level.

The result of the annual assessment and other relevant data are used to determine the effectiveness of the program during assessment of the learning outcomes.





## UAE Drones for Good Award

Mr. Ishaq Al Hashmi along with his other team-mates is a part of the project called, "See in Sea". The project highlights the aspect of a fully autonomous drone, which will fly above the sea and pass through certain points with the GPS (Global Positioning System). Locations will be



targeted to areas close to factories and waste management regions where the percentage of oil pollution is very high. The central idea is that in UAE, the sea is the major source of electricity, water and food. Thus, any amount of pollution will affect the community to a great extent.

The drone constructed by the team works by capturing images using a very high-quality camera attached to the body. The images are stored in a separate file by which they are examined by a computer using an algorithm that breaks the stored images into RGB level bands. An experimental trial proved that the mechanism of computer analysis to be highly efficient. Six different samples were tested and it provided an outstanding result of speed of two seconds per detection. A further development of the camera could be through adding night vision sensors.

The learning outcome monitoring include aligning of domain mission to institutional mission



and finally to the program objective. These broad goals are categorized in two categories namely educational goal and operational goal.

Mapping of Program Educational Objectives (PEOs) and Program Learning Outcome (PLOs):

PEOs and PLOs are linked through mapping of learning outcomes with established objectives. Each outcome have an objective and achievement of the outcome indicates the attainment of the said objective.

Assessment of learning outcomes:

Each outcome is assessed by at least one direct and one indirect method of evaluation. It is ensured that the outcome achieved is consistent with the objective and thereby with the mission at the institutional and domain level.

The result of the annual assessment and other relevant data are used to determine the effectiveness of the program during assessment of the learning outcomes.

### Program Review:

Through program review we assess and overview the following criteria:
