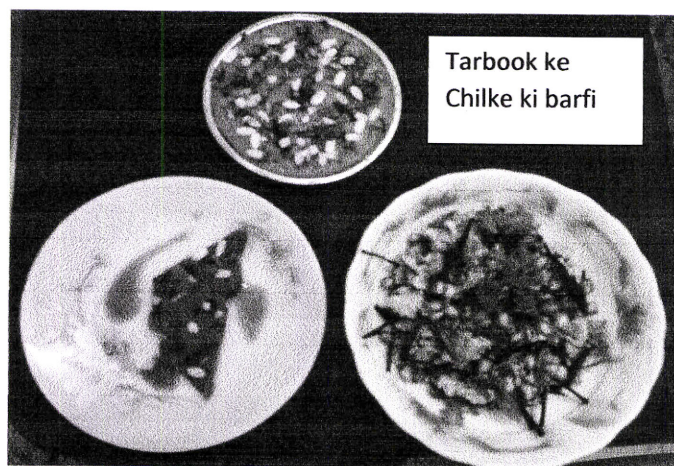



Some Key Highlights of the FDP are:

- Collaborative teaching and Learning are the future and there should be more focus on Andragogical methods
- Purpose of Legal Research mainly involves understanding the evolution and functioning of law, understanding legal reforms, making a comparative analysis with other legal systems, suggesting changes in the existing legal system, implementing the law effectively and using it for further Academic Research.
- Qualities of a good researcher include scientific temper, visionary thinking, personal taste, command over Legal Principles, perseverance, independent judgment, and unbiased attitude.
- Quotients of Teaching mainly include IQ level – Intelligence Quotient, EQ Level – Emotional Quotient, Social Intelligence and Body Language and a teacher must understand and distinguish between the ability and disability of the students.
- A teacher's main role is of facilitator and teaching involves planning and action at every step.
- Academic Research is important and methods like Design Thinking Methods and Agile Methods to develop an Outcome-Based Learning System may be used.
- Ethics in Legal Research are very important as many stakeholders rely on and are affected by the outcome of legal research.



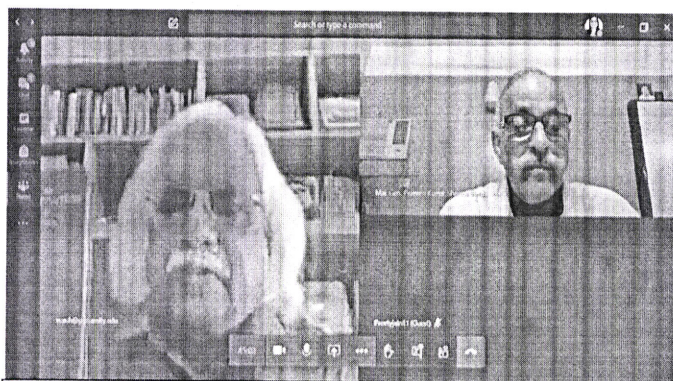

Legal Education and Changes in Pedagogy

The First Session of the FDP was chaired by Prof(Dr) S. Shantha Kumar, Vice Chancellor, Gujarat National Law University.



Prof. Dr. Shantha Kumar is an alumnus of Madras University, Chennai, where he earned his Graduation, Post-Graduation and Doctorate Degrees in Law. With about 28 years of teaching experience at prestigious Universities including Hidayatullah National Law University, Prof. Shantha Kumar's areas of

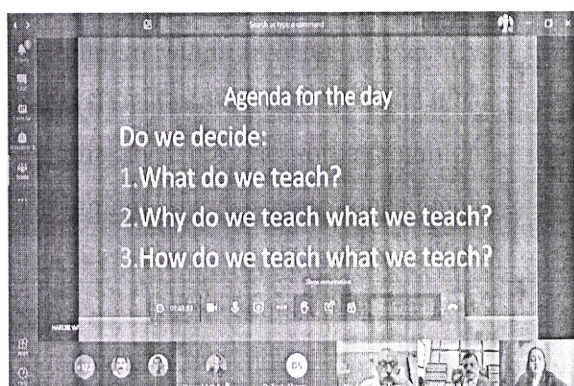
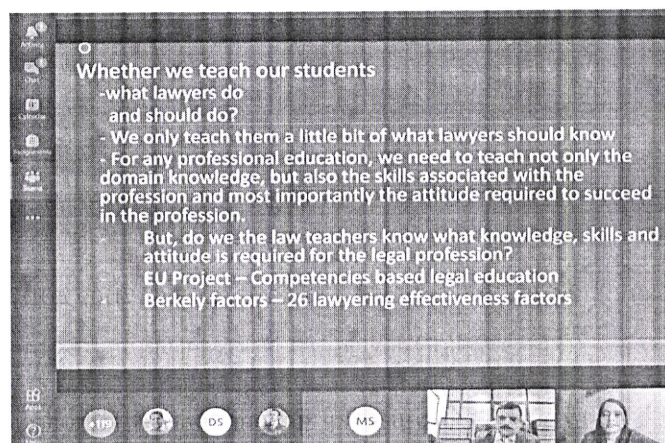
specialization are Environmental Law, Human Rights Law, International Law and Constitutional Law and he has authored 3 books on Environmental Law and 2 books on Human Rights Law. Prof. Kumar is the Chair of Environmental Law Study Group of the International Association of Law Schools and Member of the Teaching and Capacity Building Committee of the IUCN Academy of Environmental Law. He has received many prestigious awards and is serving as the Country Focal Point for India and a Consultant for the Asian Development Bank's Technical Assistance project on

Environment and Climate Change Law. Recently, he has been elected to represent South and West Asia as a Member of the Governing Board at the International Union for Conservation of Nature.

Prof. Dr. Shantha Kumar began the Session with showing his pleasure that Amity Law School, Gurugram had taken the initiative to conduct this FDP on one of the most important issues in the Teaching and Learning process, especially in the field of law.

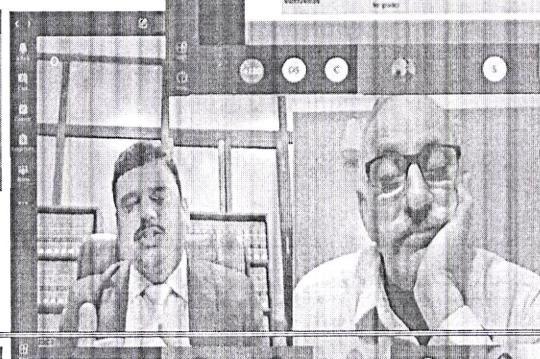
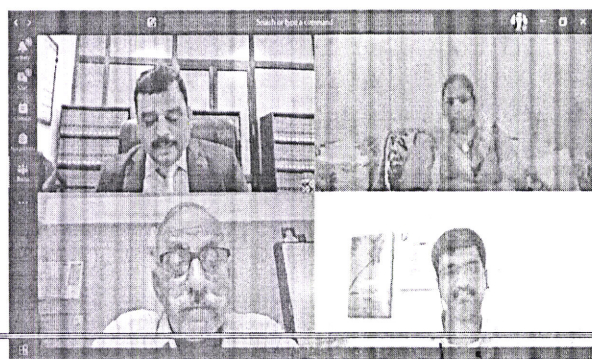
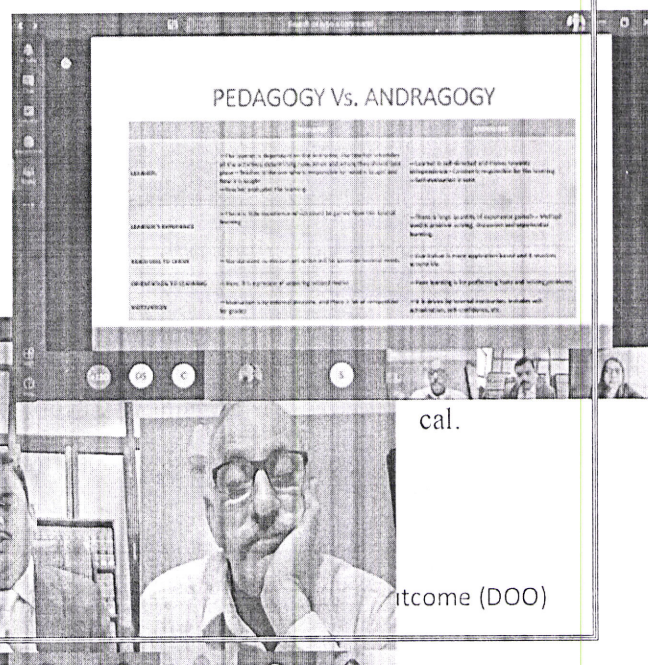
Prof. Kumar while saying that though the NET requirement as minimum eligibility for University Law Teachers is not a very good idea but it does provide for a common minimum standard. He questioned the Participants on the competencies essential to be acquired by a Law Graduate at the end of the Graduate

Programme and whether any text specifies what Law Teachers need to teach them to gain these competencies. He emphasized on the need to change the teaching methodology and adapt to the needs of today's students.



Prof. Kumar in his Session emphasized that each one of us, the Teachers especially Law Teachers, need to collaborate with each other and come up with more effective teaching learning methods in the field of law. Prof. Kumar also expressed his willingness to collaborate with Amity Law School in the near future in this regard.

The Session concluded with Prof. Dr. Shantha Kumar distinguishing between Pedagogy and Andragogy. He elucidated that the biggest change lies in understanding that University teaching needs to be Andragogical rather than Pedagogy



The Session was very interactive and several questions were put to Dr. Kumar where Participants wanted to know the efficacy of the Five Years Law Course in integrating the learning approach of budding lawyers and the future approach to teaching in the light of possible beginning of the new Session Online. Prof Kumar opined that so far as new entrants are concerned, it would not be advisable to begin their Session Online. The Question-Answer Session was coordinated by MrPranshul Pathak, Chief Coordinator.



The Vote of Thanks was proposed by Maj. Gen. P K Sharma, Prof. & Director Amity Law School, Dean Faculty of Law, Amity University Gurugram. Gen. Sharma expressed his thanks to the Vice Chancellor for sparing some time from his busy schedule and addressing the Participants. 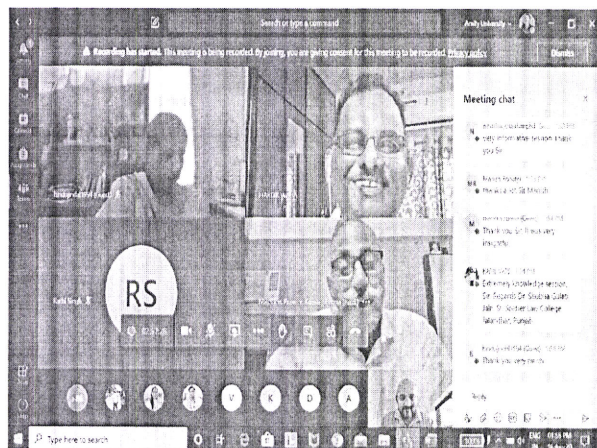
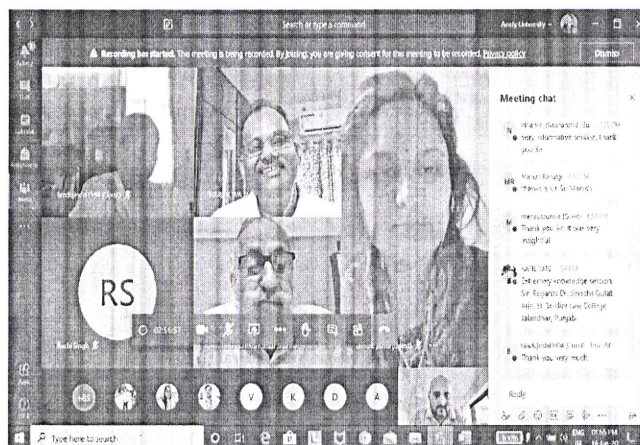

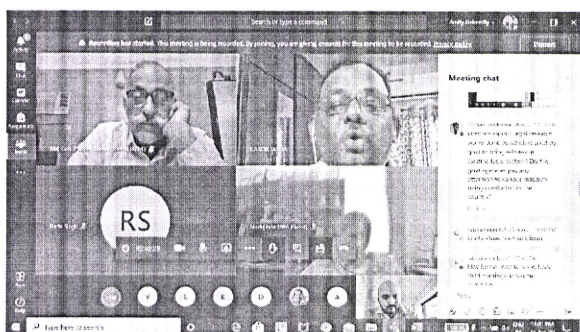
Through an illustrative Power Point Presentation, Prof. Jayakumar first explained the Definition of the term Research and then went on to explain the purpose of Legal Research and the important steps required to be taken to conduct it. He pointed out that the purpose of Research must always be kept in mind while conceptualizing verifying the data. He explained what points must be avoided in formulating Research Problem. The Guest then on to explain the various Methods can be adopted for Legal Research, Historical, Analytical, Developmental, Critical, Doctrinal, Empirical, Behavioural, Statistical, Inter-disciplinary and Multi-disciplinary. He then elaborated on how to conduct Pilot Study, Formulation of Hypothesis, Research Design, Collection of Data in Doctrinal/Empirical Research, Analysis of Data and Report Writing. He then focused on the concept of Pilot Study in relation to Preparation of Bibliography, Identification of similar work done, Visiting of Resource Libraries, Collection of Samples, Collection of published statistics, Consultation of Resource Persons and Consultation with Research Supervisor.



Prof. Jaya Kumar highlighted that the Purpose for conducting Legal Research includes understanding the evolution and functioning of law, understanding legal reforms, making a comparative analysis with other legal systems, suggesting changes in the existing legal system, implementing the law effectively and using it for further Academic Research.

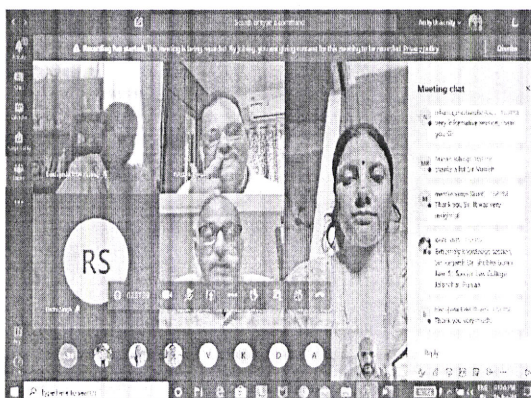
He further emphasised that the Formulation of Hypothesis must be general, testable, feasible, tenable and introduction of Research Work should include Statement of Problem, Legal Significance of study, Aims and Objectives of study, Source of Information, Statement of Hypothesis and Scope and Limitations of study. Prof. Kumar while listing the qualities of a good researcher said that he/she must have scientific temper, visionary thinking, personal taste, command over Legal Principles, perseverance, independent judgment and unbiased attitude.

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The Address by Prof. Kumar was followed by a flurry of questions which were duly answered by him. This made the Session highly interesting and inter-active. The Question-Answer Session was coordinated by MrPranshul Pathak, Chief Coordinator.

Vote of Thanks was proposed by Maj Gen Sharma (Retd), Professor and Director Law School, Dean Faculty of Law, Amity University Haryana. He thanked Prof Jayakumar for an outstanding Session wherein, with complete clarity, he explained and every aspect related to Legal Research. Sharma while thanking Prof Kumar for sharing his knowledge on Legal Research said that the Participants definitely would have enriched with the knowledge which he shared with them and it would definitely assist each of them in conducting their Research in more practical manner.

Teaching and Research Techniques in Law.



The Third Session of the FDP was chaired by Prof (Dr) NishthaJaswal, Vice Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh National Law University and commenced with a **Welcome Note** for the Resource Person by MsSanjumBedi, the Coordinator for the Session. **The Session was attended by around 120 participants.** Dr.

Nishthastarted with explaining the significance of the Teaching Profession and stated that this noble profession calls for constant research undertaken with latest techniques. Prof. Jaswal said that, "it is

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not possible to survive in the legal profession if one remains stagnant and is not inclined towards keeping oneself updated. The value of research in the life of a teacher is undeniable, be it at the level of school, college, or university.” She recited two Hindi Poems written by her, one succinctly bringing out ‘what a Teacher should be’ and the other describing ‘what is Research and how it should be conducted’.

Prof. Jaswal suggested that a good teacher should not crib about the behaviour of students but must develop capability to slowly and subtly, without getting discouraged, imbibe good qualities in them. Citing ‘Kautilya’ she said, “*A teacher is not a mediocre human being, the source of either devastation or*



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dedication is an important virtue that a teacher must definitely possess. She emphasized that a teacher should never refrain from one’s duties and must perform these religiously.



Quoting from a Sanskrit shloka, she said that “*A human being without knowledge is like a stray animal*”. She felt that the most important quality of a teacher other than knowledge is his/her **personality**. She said that a teacher should not only have excellent **evaluative skills** in order to understand the psychology of the students but should learn to

maintain a decent distance with them. Prof. Jaswal mentioned that yet another very important quality which a teacher must possess is the **ability to control one’s anger**. She stated that ‘*a son can beevil, but a mother can never be so*’; likewise a teacher may have hundreds of good or bad pupils but she/ he must be good and kind to all. She also focussed on the quality of **Self Awareness** which every teacher must possess. Prof (Dr) Nishtha laid emphasis on the point that a teacher must be a source of abundant knowledge. She/he must not teach out-dated, abolished and obsolete laws. She elucidated by quoting George **Bernard Shaw**- “*Beware of having false knowledge. It is more dangerous than being ignorant*”. A teacher should always do excessive research on recent case laws and landmark judgements and should be able to make the students understand the reason behind these judgements and how the society is affected by such changes. She explained the **Quotients of Teaching** as:

- IQ level – Intelligence Quotient
- EQ Level – Emotional Quotient

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- Social Intelligence
- Body Language

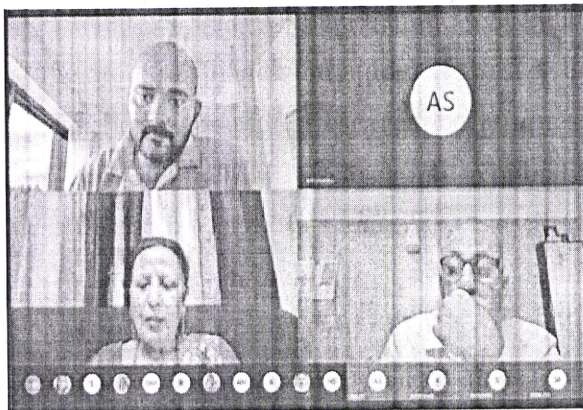
Amongst all these, she focused on the **Emotional Intelligence Quotient** and that a teacher must understand and distinguish between the ability and disability of the students. Some are fast learners and some are slow learners. The Mentor should be sensitive to the slow



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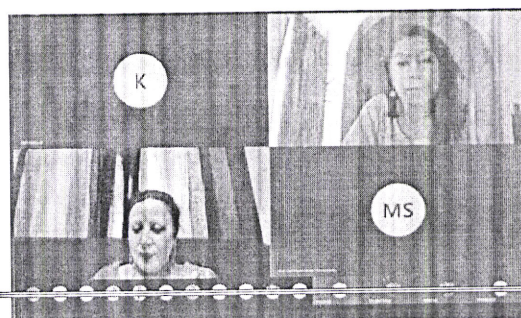
and should be highly vigilant that the weak students are not mocked at. **She said that teaching is the noblest profession and the Best Karma.** The Session was then navigated towards understanding about the **Research Techniques** where she explained various Research Methods such as **Fundamental Research and Applied Research**. She explained to the Participants that these Research Methods are a tool to verify the existing theory or giving a new theory such as in the **Navtej Singh Johar Case and Sabrimala Casewhich are great examples of Constitutional Morality**. A research should focus on current issues which may be applicable on the current scenario of the society such as **Covid 19 and Human Rights issues**. She also mentioned and explained the **Theories of Justice and Utilitarian Theory**. To explain her point, she mentioned **VishakhaJudgement, Guidelines on Inter-Country Adoption (KARA) and also DK Basu's case.**



Prof. Jaswal while discussing Research Techniques in Law, explained some main Tools of Research like, **Hypothesis, difference between Qualitative and Quantitative Research, Statistical Testing, Data Collection, Data Analysis, Research Design, Literature Review: Reports and Judicial Decisions and requirements for an**

Empirical Research. According to her, the most important **Qualities of a Good Researcher** are, a scientific mind, clear intentions, understanding of the basic requirements of Research, ability to face challenges and a valid Research.

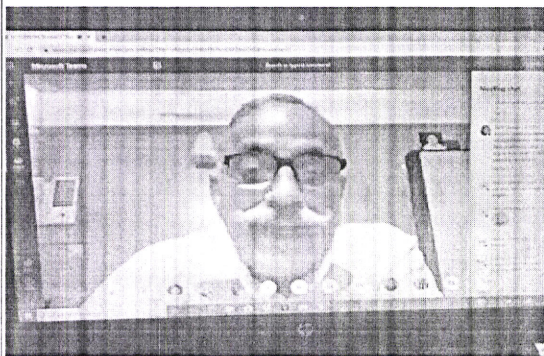
This was followed by a number of questions by the participants which were duly answered the Resource Person to their satisfaction. The Question-Answer Session was coordinated by

Legal Literature and Research

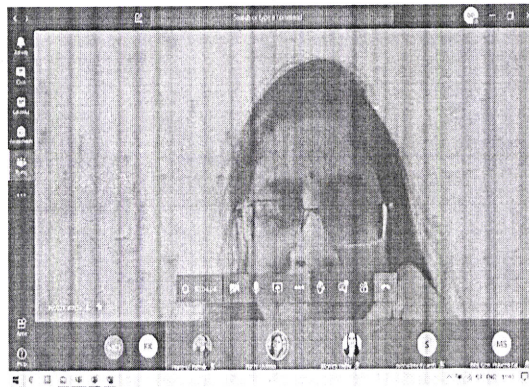


The fourth day of the FDP was assigned to the topic Legal Literature and Research and was chaired by **Prof. (Dr) Versha Vahini, HOD, Faculty of Law, Manav Rachna University.**

The Session began with a Welcome Address by Dr ArchnaSehrawat, Assistant Professor, Amity Law School, wherein she extended a warm welcome to the esteemed Guest and all

the other Participants. Dr Versha has over 16 years of teaching and research experience and has worked with many eminent institutes including- Indian Law Institute- New Delhi; NLSIU- Bangalore; NUJS- Kolkatta, NLIU- Bhopal and others. She has also presented and written many acclaimed articles and research papers for various prestigious journals. Her areas of interest include corporate and competition law. She has authored many books, including 'Indian Competition Law' which has been published by Lexis Nexis and has co-authored a book on 'Right to Information Act'. She is also the general editor of Ratanlal's and Dhirajlal's- Indian Penal Code, student edition for Lexis Nexis. The event was attended by 137 Participants.

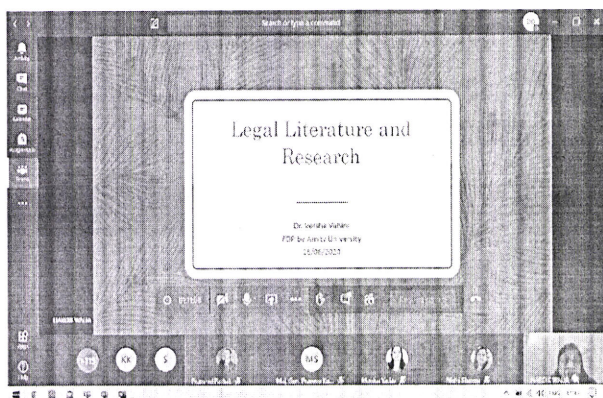
Prof. Vahini's Session was not only theoretical, she made it interactive by giving various exercises seeking participation of each Participant. She started the Session with a deep breathing exercise and asked the Participants to remember the teacher who influenced their life most. She interacted with Maj. Gen. P.K. Sharma (Retd.) and other Faculty Members who shared their cherished memories of the most admired teacher in their lives. While concluding this activity, Prof. Vahini stated that all good teachers have some common attributes in them, which influence the student for life, like- knowledge, patience, confidence, caring, dedication toward students, empathy, engaging, encouraging, etc.



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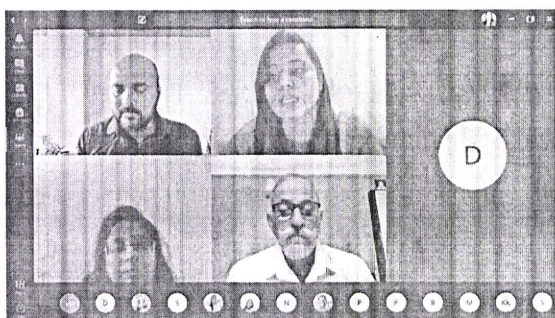
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Prof. Vahini then conducted the Session through a PPT, inter-alia, explaining the concept of research in general for academics, publication and teaching as well. She highlighted the importance of research in academics by stating that they go hand in hand, so a good teacher needs to research and read. Prof. Vahini further discussed various research

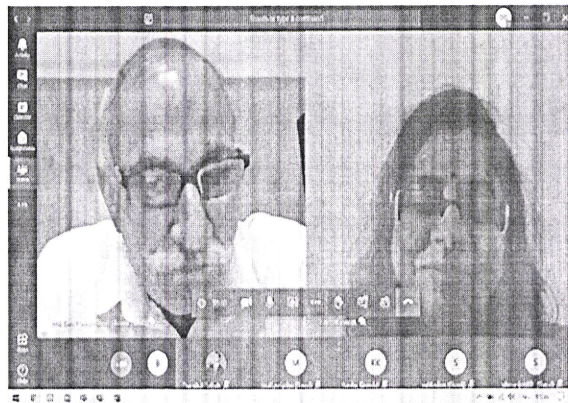
approaches, namely- Philosophical Worldview, Paradigms, Epistemologies and Perspective. Then she explained plans and procedures for research, like selecting Research Design and Methods of Data Collection, etc. She discussed the four major Worldviews (Post-positivism, Constructive, Transformative and Pragmatism), Research Design Selection (Quantitative, Mixed and Qualitative) in detail. Then to make the Participants understand the context better, she conducted an activity to identify various Research Approaches for various scenarios. She then moved into Teaching-Learning Process and emphasised the importance of this process by stating that a major part of teacher's life must be devoted to encourage students to keep moving in the right direction and a person cannot motivate others if he/she is not himself/herself motivated.



She mentioned the role of a teacher as "Facilitator" in a student's life. She highlighted that teaching involves planning and action at every step. Then she explained the Design Thinking Methods and Agile Methods to develop an Outcome-Based Learning System. It was explained to her by Maj. Gen. P.K.

Sharma (Retd.) that Amity Law School, Gurugram already follow this method in their teaching and curriculum planning. Prof. Vahini was very impressed with this disclosure and discussed the benefits of the same. She conducted another activity to help the Participants understand different barriers faced by students and teachers in the Learning Process and then explained the process to overcome such Barriers.

Prof. Vahini also highlighted the use of Bloom's Taxonomy in Legal Education and described all six levels of the Taxonomy with examples and another activity of application of Bloom's Taxonomy in legal subjects for better understanding. Then she explained the different techniques that could be used in legal teaching, like- Socratic Method, Case Study Method, Discussion, Debate, Lecture Method, Problem Analysis and Solution Method. This was followed by yet another activity for Participants where they were asked to explain what method they would choose for a specific topic and the reason for the same. Prof. Vahini then moved into various Assessment Methods and Rubrics which was concluded with another activity in which Participants were asked to prepare a utility table by choosing various assessment methods.

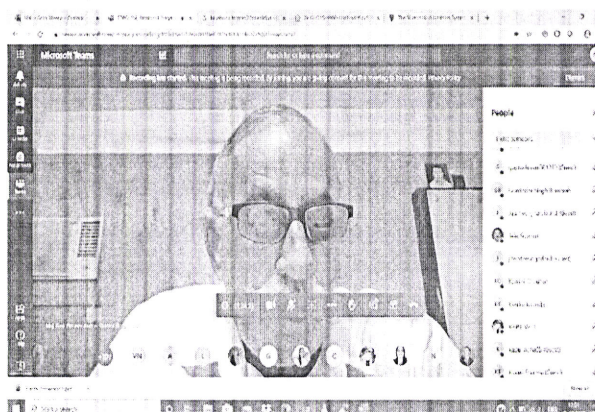


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In the end, Prof. Vahini answered the questions raised by the Participants, with regard to Academic Research and the ways in which teachers can make the teaching learning process more effective. The Question-Answer Session was coordinated by MrPranshul Pathak, Chief Coordinator.

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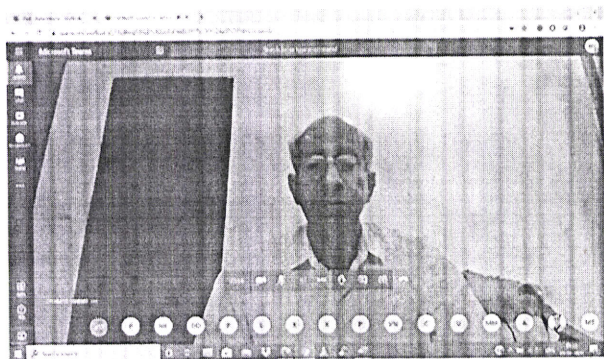

Ethics in Legal Research

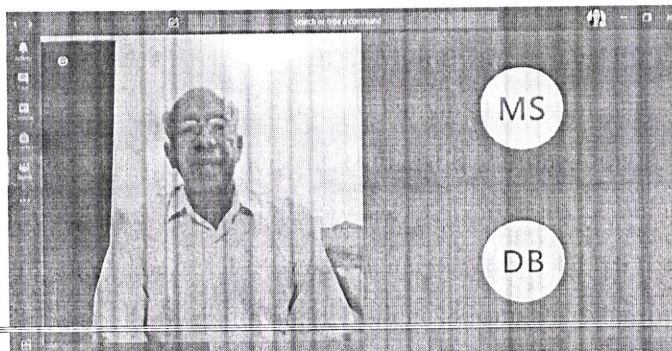
The concept of 'Ethics in Research' refers to a complex set of values, standards and institutional schemes that help to regulate research in a scientific manner. Ethics is very important in every field of research because that make research trustworthy. Ethical conduct helps us navigate the gray area between absolute right and morally wrong. This provides the structure that helps us make a decision we can be proud of. There are multiple reasons why it is necessary to adhere to the basic ethics during Academic Research. The credibility of the research is solely dependent on the methods used by the researcher during his/ her research.



With that in view, **Ethics in Legal Research** was chosen as the topic of discussion for the Final Day of this Faculty Development Program. The Session was chaired by **Prof. (Dr.) K.P.S. Mahalwar**, Chair Professor at National Law University, Delhi and Member of Haryana Higher Education Council at Govt.

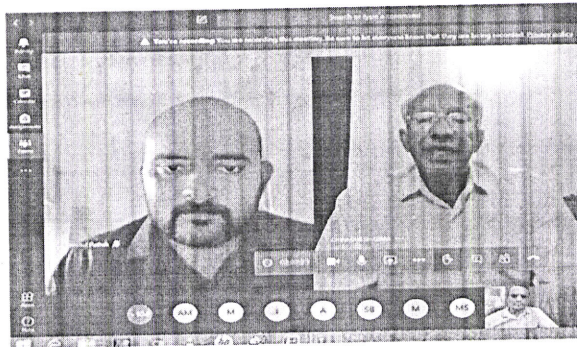
of Haryana. Formerly, he was Head and Dean Faculty of Law, M.D. University, Rohtak. Prof. K.P.S. Mahalwar has been in teaching and research for more than 35 years. The Session was attended by **121 Participants** from different Universities and Colleges from all over India. The Session began with a Welcome Address by Dr Vijay Pal Singh, Coordinator for the Session.

Prof. (Dr.) K.P.S. Mahalwar began his address by stating that teachers are torch bearers of education for the future generation on whose shoulders rests the development of any Nation. Creation of knowledge is an on-going process and not a static one. The general perception of the people is that ethics and morals are synonyms, it is not so. These maybe overlapping in certain situations are two different concepts. Ethics



basically the behavior, conduct and values acceptable by the society at large. As Lawyers, we are compelled to follow the professional ethics which are prescribed by the BCI even in cases where one's conscious may not allow us to proceed. Prof. Mahalwar further mentioned the significance of ethics in Legal Research. He emphasized that Legal research is not just collection of data or cut, copy, paste but it requires application of mind.

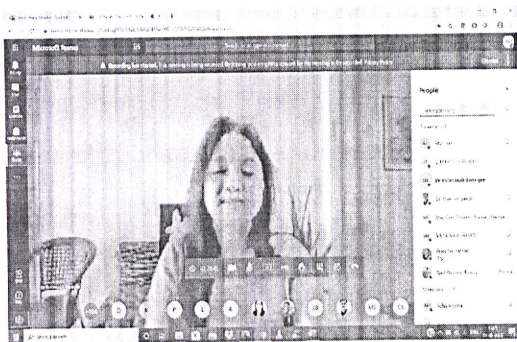
Prof. Mahalwar opined that Legal Research needs to be done with integrity and utmost honesty as many stakeholders rely on it. Ethics has to be imbibed in us, in our conduct and there is a need to have a holistic view about the same. Prof. Mahalwar explained this by throwing light on its



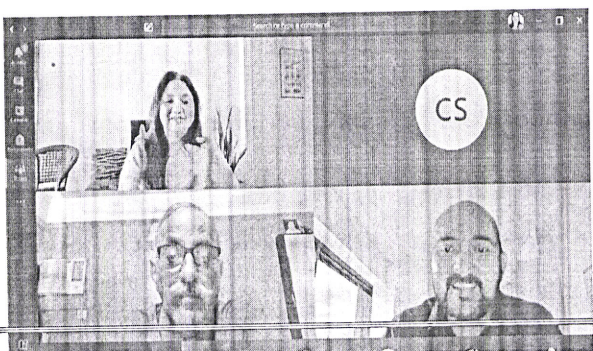
importance in selection of a Research Problem (whether it will benefit mankind), Objective of Research (whether there is any utility), Research Design (whether appropriate) and whether the conclusion of Research has any relevance for the public at large. The Revered Guest emphasized that the funding agencies should be transparent in their approach and should not look towards a Research only favouring their needs. The supervisors should play an important role in applying Ethical Principles and they should not lose their credibility, rather assist in conducting of an unbiased research. Prof. Mahalwar concluded by saying that Ethics is required at every stage of research. This keeps the dignity of participants intact and does not compromise with the welfare of people. He said that a teacher is Nation Builder and must be most ethical.

This was followed by various questions asked by the Participants which were duly answered by the Guest. The Question-Answer Session was coordinated by MrPranshul Pathak, Chief Coordinator.

Valedictory Session of the FDP by Prof. (Dr) Padmakali Banerjee, Pro Vice Chancellor, Amity University Gurugram



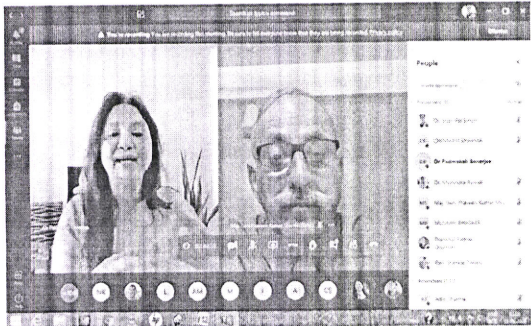

3.1 General Introduction of the Event

Robotic Process Automation is the technology that allows anyone today to configure computer software, or a “robot” to emulate and integrate the actions of a human interacting within digital systems to execute a business process. RPA robots utilize the user interface to capture data and manipulate applications just like humans do. They interpret, trigger responses and communicate with other systems in order to perform on a vast variety of repetitive tasks. Only substantially better: an RPA software robot never sleeps and makes zero mistakes.

UiPath is a global software company that develops a platform for robotic process automation. UiPath has become the first vendor of scale to bring together both process mining and robotic process automation. Last year AUH and UiPath had collaboration under an Academic Alliance program. As a result RPA was introduced as an elective course in B.Tech(CSE/ME/ECE) final year. The purpose of this FDP was to train the faculty members to teach this course and take up RAP related projects.

3.2 Objectives of the Event

- Understand the basics of Robotic Process Automation
- Use and understand the various functionalities and features of UiPath Studio and Orchestrator
- Identify processes which can be automated
- Develop and deploy attended and unattended robots independently

3.3 Brief about the address/talk of speakers


Day 1(December 26, 2020)

In the inaugural session, Prof. A. K. Yadav, Director, Amity School of Applied Sciences, Amity University Haryana welcomed the participants and the delegates.



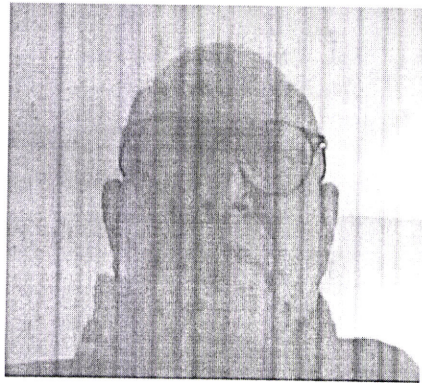

This was followed by the keynote lecture by Prof. A. K. Kapoor (former VC Jiwaji University, Gwalior, MP and Former HoD, Dept. of Anthropology, Delhi University, New Delhi, India). He focused on the several components of the development of forensic science (FS) courses. He has also discussed about the historical aspects of forensic science and jobs probabilities after doing these courses. During his talk, Prof. Kapoor mentioned about the funding agencies of government of India with special reference to those that support research in the realm of FS. He also gave some suggestions for the improvement of the syllabus of FS courses. 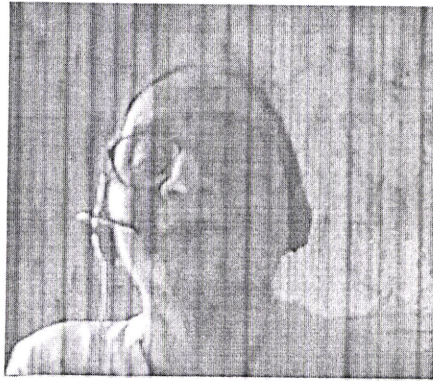


country. He said that the associations and societies should be functional and symposium and conferences must be organized for awareness and positive outcomes of such events.

After keynote session, Prof. Sanjeev Lalwani (Registrar (Academics) and Professor (JPNATC) Forensic Medicine AIIMS, New Delhi, India) delivered an expert talk on "Forensic investigation of Road Traffic Accidents fatalities". He highlighted the objectives of medico-legal examinations of injuries resulting from road accidents. He mentioned that according to the Good Samaritan Act, the lifesaving treatment should be given first to the injured individual before the medico-legal examination in any road accident takes place. He said that the use of photography can play very important role in the investigations of crime scene. Then he described about the several kind of injuries like lacerations, chest injuries, abdominal injuries, and spinal injuries, secondary injuries happened during the road traffic accidents. Following are some photographs of some slides he presented.

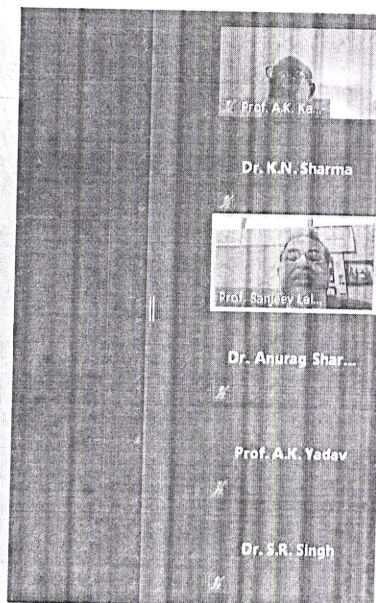

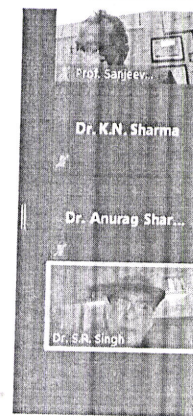

Singh, Forensic Physics Expert, NICFS, Delhi and Former Director, CFSL/CBI, New Delhi, India delivered an expert lecture on "Forensic Science with Special Reference to Forensic Physics". 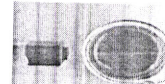

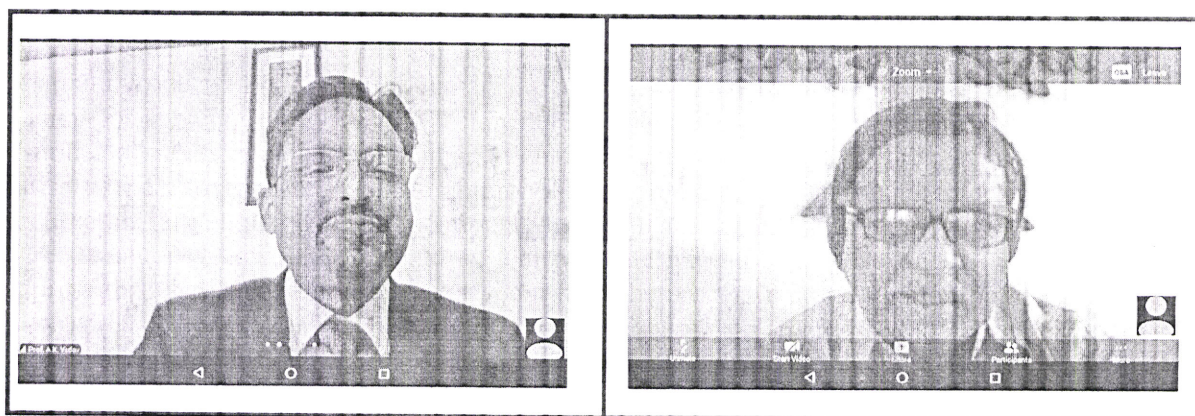
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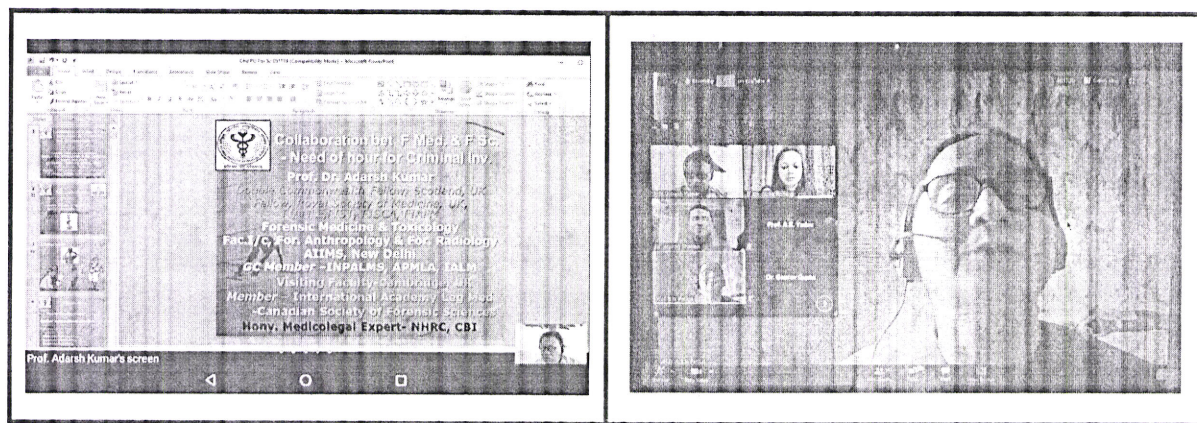

Day 2 (December 27, 2020)

The first talk was by Dr. Adarsh Kumar (Professor-JPNATC) entitled "Collaboration between Forensic Medicine and Forensic Science - Need of Hour for Criminal Investigation". Dr. Anurag Sharma introduced Prof. Adarsh Kumar. Prof. A. K. Yadav expressed his gratitude to Prof. Adarsh Kumar for agreeing to deliver the lecture. Prof. Adarsh Kumar, a recipient of several awards and member of several national and international societies, talked about forensic medicine, medical jurisprudence, toxicology, forensic anthropology, forensic deontology and forensic radiology. He focused his talk on autopsy and mentioned the fact that people due to their religious beliefs do not agree to autopsy however our legal system mandate it. Thus, using advanced techniques we can address this challenge. He also talked about how the process of investigation on a dead person is handled by police, doctors and finally by forensic experts. He emphasized a fact that how poor our Indian system is, in handling such complex issues. 80% of the autopsy cases instead of being handled forensic experts are performed by doctors. He concluded his talk by making a statement that for the best conclusion of a criminal case; it must be undertaken by jointly by the police, doctors and of course by forensic experts. At the end, he addressed questions asked by the audience. The vote of thank was delivered by Dr. Seema R. Pathak, HOD, CBFS.

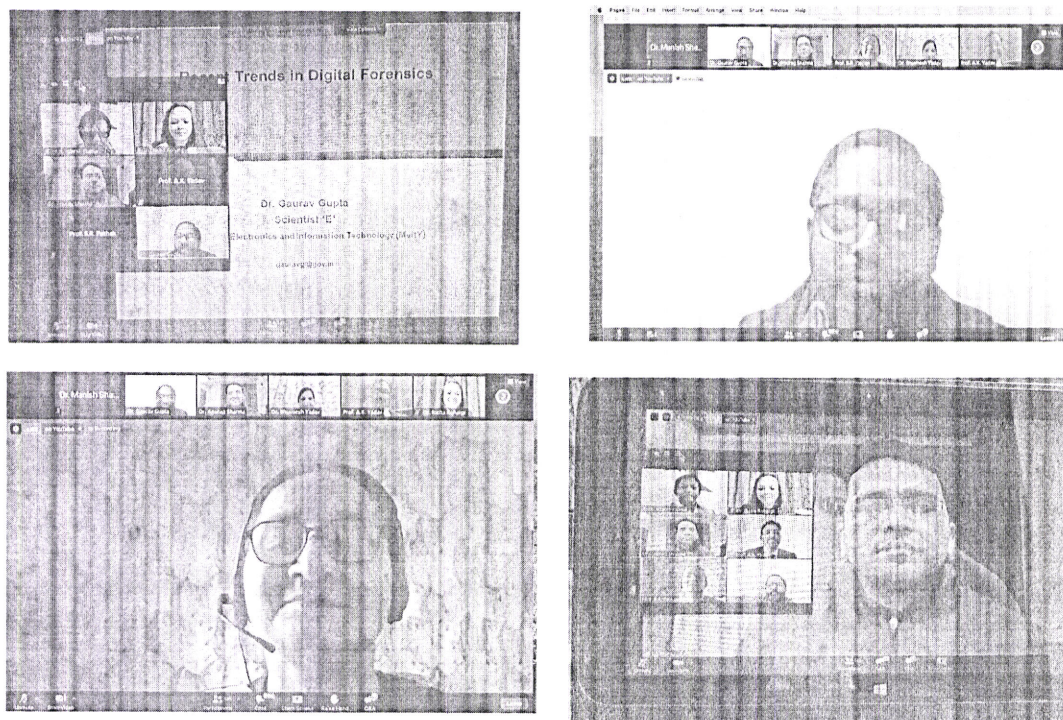

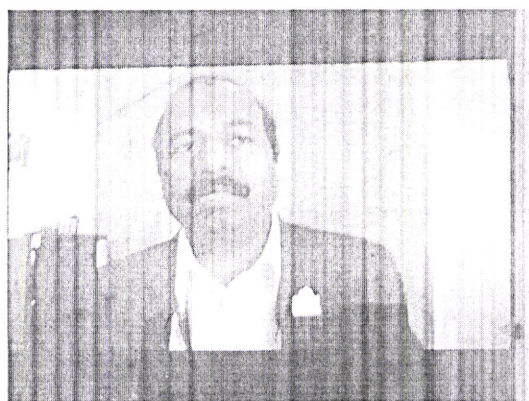
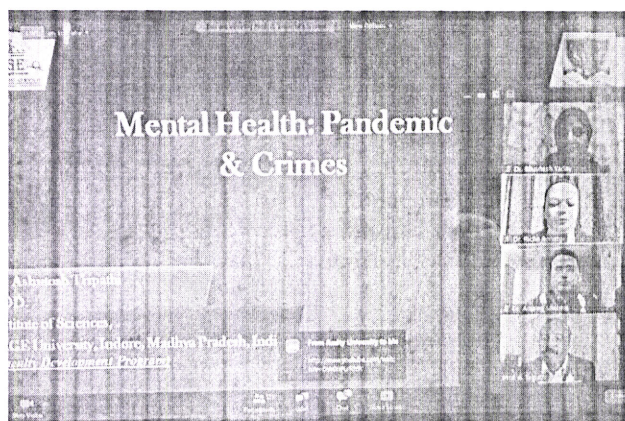
In the second talk for the day, Dr. Gaurav Gupta (Additional Director, Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology, GOI, New Delhi, India) talked about “Recent Trends in Digital Forensics”. Dr. Anurag Sharma introduced Dr. Gaurav Gupta. Prof. A. K. Yadav delivered his gratitude to Dr. Gaurav Gupta for agreeing to deliver the talk. Dr. Gupta explained that cyber forensic which is only a two-decade-old field attracted huge attention because of multiple digital frauds like ATM fraud, digital car key fraud, phishing emails, etc. Dr. Gupta also explained the correlation of the intelligent human brain and poor sensory system that is the reason behind cyber frauds. He tried to explain this correlation through jumbled alphabets. Dr. Gupta discussed the evolution of cyber forensic and its golden era. Dr. Gupta raised questions on testing processes of new digital developments and tried to explain the extreme level of competition during the development of technology might be a reason behind poor testing standards. He explained the exploitation of emotions that is used by criminals during cyber frauds. Many more things like fake videos/photos, fake news/ Fake documents/NFC based frauds, rank of websites in Alexa were explained in details by Dr. Gupta. Day 3 (December 28, 2020)

The 3rd day of the FDP started with the lecture of Prof. A. K. Tripathi (HOD, Institute of Sciences, SAGE University, Indore, MP, India). The title of his lecture was “Mental Health: Pandemic & Crimes”. Starting with this extremely important and contemporary topic Prof. Tripathi reminded the audience about the age old concept of happiness through sharing. He impressed upon the sayings of great philanthropists like Swami Vivekananda and Mother Teresa who advised the humanity to share their possessions like wealth, knowledge and compassion. He beautifully analyzed the Indian tradition of painting ‘Rangoli’ where the need of the microcosm was also taken into consideration. Dr. Tripathi mentioned rightly that the issue of mental health has now gained even a superior importance in current Covid-19 affected world. As an alarming statistics provided by Indian Mental Health Association (IMHA) which showed a 20% increase in mental disease cases. Alongside there is a sharp rise in crime incidents with deterioration of overall mental health of the society during this pandemic tenure as was pointed by Dr. Tripathi. Dr. Tripathi then exquisitely pointed the main problem of mental health lies with the acceptability of the mental health issue by the victim himself. He advised strong that to live a happy life every person should retrospect themselves to understand any form of hidden stress, problem beneath apparent presentable social life. Moving with the lecture he classified the mental health issues under four categories like 1. Physiological, 2. Psychological, 3. Social and 4. Behavioral. He later explained all these categories where he mentioned that symptoms like migraine, insomnia and back pain can arise out of sustained mental stress, the psychological sides of mental health can lead to confidence loss, low self-esteem and in extreme cases can lead to suicidal tendency. The social aspects of mental health strongly features social withdrawal which in turn deeply affects the interpersonal relations of the victim. Thereafter, he elaborated on the behavioral aspects of mental health which suddenly leads a marked change in behavior of the victim sometimes which might lead to over aggressiveness and radical thinking. The speaker reminded repeatedly of seeking professional help for mental health related problem whenever necessary. Dr. Tripathi suggested a number of simple exercises that can help us in coming out from mental stress and other depressions. Among them he mentioned the importance of setting important personal goals for every day, assessing the probabilities and possibilities of every task etc. He emphasized on the fact that to overcome a mental debacle one must first accept it, analyze it and then should go for appropriate diagnosis and treatment.

The extremely relevant and enlightening talk by Dr. Tripathi was followed by an extensive Q and A session, where Dr. Tripathi answered many related queries from the audience and assured the gathering that we should consider the pandemic as a temporary situation and we will overcome the crisis hour. After his insightful lecture, vote of thanks was provided by Dr. Richa Rohatgi, Assistant professor, CBFS.

In the second talk for the day, Dr. Vivek Sahajpal, Assistant Director, SFSL, HP, DFSS, Govt. of India delivered a talk on “Forensic Investigations of Wildlife Crimes” In his talk, he explained all

the minute details about the body parts of most of the important wildlife animals and their potential benefits for the mankind. On the other hand, he also added saying that the wildlife is getting drastically affected due to commercial exploitation. As wildlife animals are being decimated to a large extent, that is why implementation of conservation/protection laws has become essential.

Moreover, he also talked about the wildlife health of India and again added that India has ranked high among the 12 mega biodiversity nations of the world. He clearly defined wildlife protection act 1972 and stated that “any animal that occurs wild in nature and is listed under schedule-I to schedule-IV of the act is a wild animal”. He also stressed on schedule-I animals such as tiger, leopard, and peacock to name a few, which are classified as most protected animals. Thereafter, he clearly defined the wildlife crime stating that “poaching of wildlife animal, captivating a wild animal and even possession of a part of product of wild animal amounts an offence”. Furthermore, he also discussed about the consequences of wildlife crime under this protection act 1972 such as imprisonment up to 3 years and fine up to Rs. 25000.

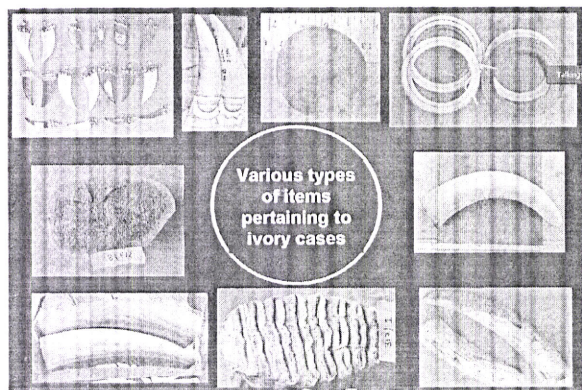
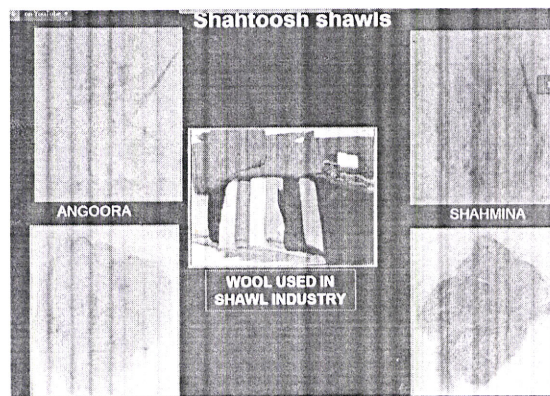
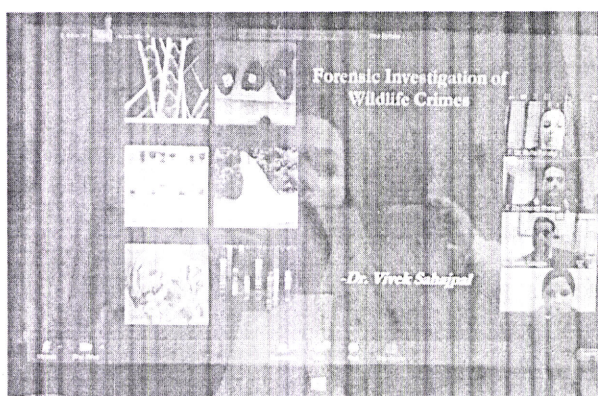
In addition, he nicely explained the illegal trade of various species of wildlife animal parts namely skin, hair, claws, bones, etc. Apart from this, he also stressed on identification of species from various body parts through forensic experimentation and further discussed on several techniques such as ‘Morphometric techniques’ for identification of various species through skin morphology. From product viewpoint, he talked about Shahtoosh shawl, which is made of wool obtained from the short, warm fleece of the rare Tibetan antelope, a species found almost exclusively in the Changtang of Tibet, on the Tibetan Plateau. For fabricating one shawl, 4-5 animals are slaughtered. In addition, he also discussed about various types of items pertaining to ivory cases. Further, he demonstrated on distinction of fake and original musk pods as the original ones are extremely expensive. Finally, he talked about the need of DNA facility for wildlife animals. In this regard, he beautifully explained about some useful molecular tools for DNA and enzyme study.

Few of the questions such as “How to collect animal poison?”; “Any data bank of wildlife DNA?” raised by the audience at the end of his talk were comprehensively answered by him followed by vote of thanks given by Dr. Richa Rohatgi. Finally, the session was ended with a big round of applause. Above all, it was a fantastic talk and was also quite informative.

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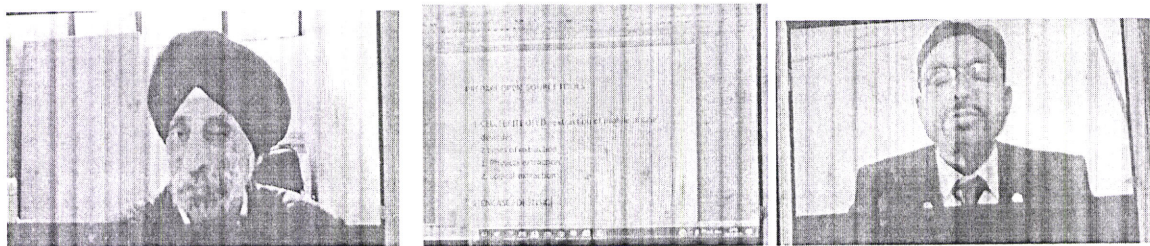

Day 4 (December 29, 2020)

The 4th day of the FDP started with the lecture of Mr. Gurcharan Singh (Faculty of Cyber Crimes, CDTs, BPR&D, Chandigarh, India). His talk was entitled as 'Mobile Forensics- Recent Challenges'. He initiated his session by highlighting the importance of original researches in mobile and cyber forensic considering the exponential rises in cybercrimes, where criminals are using modern sophisticated tools like dark web and cryptocurrency. He emphasized that more and more students and researchers should be motivated to invent new open source tools to overcome newer and steeper challenges of cybercrimes. Mr. Singh informed to the audience that currently used 'open source tools' like 'Celbrite UFED' and 'Encase Forensic' are mostly developed in US and Europe and they are extremely expensive and very much customized to the needs of those countries in many aspects thus creating a difficulty in solving cases in our Indian system. To overcome these limitations there is urgent need of development of new tools with indigenous technology and that can only be possible through extensive research. Moving with his customary flair, the speaker explained the details of logical and physical extraction processes which are regularly used for retrieving data; he nicely elaborated the limitations of existing tools where due to manufacturing limitations only 40% of the devices support the process of physical extraction; leaving a large percentage of useful data inaccessible. The lecture progressed with extreme interactive manner and Mr. Singh shared his white board and had written points over there which made an ambience of a real learning platform. He explained the role of cloud storage in retrieving data and emphasized on developments of professionals with sound knowledge of cyber forensics and clear intuition. He cautioned about the over use of search tools might lead to reduced understanding which can be very pivotal during cross examinations in judiciary. He expressed his concern on the fact that many criminals get clean chit due to improper conclusions provided by forensic experts due to their lack of concrete understanding of cybercrimes. Mr. Singh warned the audience about the rise in number of crimes and especially cyber-crimes in India during this COVID-19 pandemic tenure. He explained that these cyber-crime cases have become extremely alarming where fake Facebook ID,

false calling etc. are regularly used for offences like honey trap etc. The speaker also indicated that victims of these crimes are generally people from upper class, who even try to hide the incidents from the fear of social alienation. Mr. Singh thereafter explained the details of mobile securities including IEM number, mobile serial number etc. He explained a lot about tracking a lost mobile, his extremely educative lecture ended with an interactive Q and A session where Mr. Singh answered a handful of queries from the audience with his usual banter and wit. The session was concluded by the vote of thanks from Dr. Seema R Pathak, HoD, CBFS.

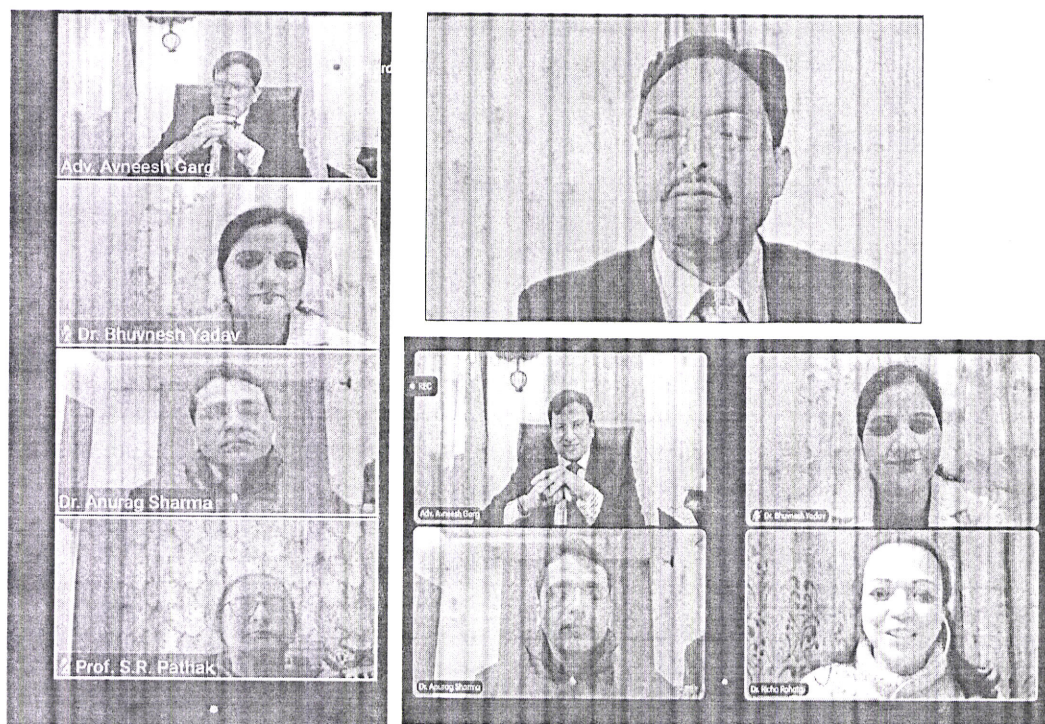

Dr. Saran also discussed about signature forgeries, evaluation in variations of handwritten documents. He also emphasized on how to minimize human bias and maintaining ethics. This was a really a nice talk on forensic document examination. After the talk, the vote of thanks was given by HOD (CBFS) Prof. Seema Pathak.

Prof. A. K. Yadav delivered his gratitude to advocate Avneesh Garg and other panelists. Advocate Avneesh Garg, member of several national societies, talked about the history of origin or the forensic science in India. He also talked the preparation of reports by forensic experts and their cross examination by layers in the court. He touched on the expectation of court from a forensic expert who is making reports for a particular case and discussed few relevant cases. He motioned that the forensic expert will play a crucial role in court for the sensitive cases in future. He also mentioned that a forensic expert must be prepare the reports of a case in such a way that all points must be conclusive and must be prepared for cross examination. He concluded his talk by a making a statement that the forensic experts must be a half lawyer since they have to deal with lawyers. At the end, he addressed questions asked by the audience. The vote of thank has been delivered by Dr. Richa Rohatgi, Dr. Seema R. Pathak, (HOD, CBSF) & Prof. A. K. Yadav, (HOI, ASAS).

Criminal Justice System is essentially an instrument of social control and it should keep on changing along with the changing social order. New rules should be added, and out-dated old rules should be discarded from time to time. A growing blot on the Criminal Justice System and emergence of new trends in crime, develop new issues and challenges, to be dealt with. With the technological advancement, the crimes and related issues are growing rapidly, and this urgently calls for drastic legal and judicial reforms so as to provide a cheap, expeditious and effective instrument for realization of justice by all sections of the people, irrespective of their social or economic position or their financial resources. In order to achieve the purpose of Grundnorm of the society, Law has always acted as potent weapon for the protection and development of the human being. The need is to provide all rights and protection of Laws to every corner of the society and equip it to handle all the emerging new trends for its advancement.

With this motto, Amity Law School, Amity University Gurugram organized a 7- days Faculty Development Program (FDP), on "Emerging Trends of Crime and Criminal Justice System in India", from 10 – 16 May 2021.



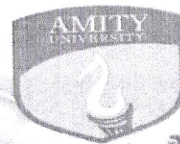

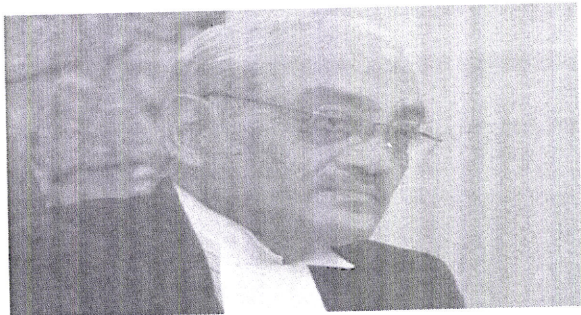


FDP on Emerging Trends of Crime and Criminal Justice System in India: Inaugural Session: 10-05-2021



While addressing the gathering, Prof. (Dr.) P.B. Sharma high-lighted the alarming fact that out of the total prison population, only 30 percent prisoners are convicts, remaining being under-trials, thus becoming the reason for overcrowded Prisons in India. He said that there is lack of timely delivery of justice, emphasizing on the phrase, "justice delayed is justice denied". He focused on the importance of revamping the current criminal jurisprudence, especially the soft area like speedy and fair trial. He also underlined on the need for new facets of Criminal Justice System.

FIRST SESSION

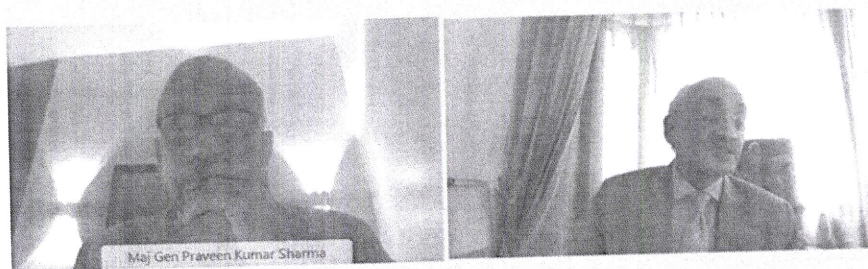


The First Session of 7- Days virtual FDP was addressed by Hon'ble Mr Justice Swatanter Kumar on the Sub-Theme, **“Protection of Human Rights of Undertrial Prisoners”**, which is an expedient part of Criminal Justice System. **The Session was attended by 137 Participants both from the field of**

Academics (Research Scholars and Faculty Members) and Bar. The revered Guest began his address with the quote, “if you want to destroy a nation destroy its education.” The Lordship explained that the purpose of Criminal Justice System in any country is to protect not only the rights of the victims but also convicts, prisoners and Undertrials. They cannot be deprived of their **Fundamental and Human Rights.** He underlined that a proper Criminal Justice System will always create a balance between the convicts, undertrials and their rights as the basic principle of criminal jurisprudence is that “every person shall be presumed innocent till proven guilty”. He

explained the term “Undertrial Prisoners” as those people who are facing trial in any court and during such trial are kept in judicial custody in prison. Lordship also shared his personal experience of how he corrected the violation of Human Rights of some Undertrial Prisoners vis-à-vis favourable treatment being given to some of them, while he was a Judge of Punjab & Haryana High. Court. Speaking further, he asserted that all human beings are entitled to some basic Human Rights being inalienable, natural or birth rights of human being. A prisoner, be he a convict or Undertrial, does not cease to be a human being and thus, remains entitled to Human Rights as prescribed under U.N Charter and Universal Declaration of Human Rights. While explaining the same, he highlighted the provisions of Articles 1 and 55 (c) of U.N Charter as well as the Preamble and Article 1 of Universal Declaration of Human Rights, relative to the protection of Human Rights of Undertrial Prisoners. Lordship, further cited the provisions of Fundamental Rights enshrined by Indian Constitution, such as Articles 14, 19, 21 and 22. Elaborating the concept, he elucidated upon

various landmark judgements of Supreme court of India, like Sunil Batra v. Delhi Administration, ADM Jabalpur v. Shivakant Shukla, Hussainara Khatoon (II) v. Home Secretary, State of Bihar, Joginder Singh v. State of U.P. and D.K. Basu v. State of West Bengal which are considered to be bible on the protection of Human Rights of Undertrial Prisoners. In the end, Lordship concluded by illuminating that no person should be made to suffer the deprivations of incarceration before he/she has been proven guilty in the eyes of law. Moreover, the reformatory ideology must be implemented accordingly so that after release from the jail, a person must not suffer from social negligence and can successfully exercise right to profession and run his or her family.


POINTS TO REMEMBER

1. Purpose of Criminal Justice System is to deliver an efficient, effective, accountable and fair justice process for the public.
2. No person should be deprived of his basic Human and Fundamental Rights.
3. A proper and efficient Criminal Justice System always draws a balance between the individual's interest and societal interest.
4. All agencies of a Criminal Justice System including the Police, Judiciary, Prosecution, Defence Lawyers and the Prison Department must adopt a concerted and a well-coordinated approach to ameliorate the plight of the 'forgotten souls' i.e., Undertrial Prisoners, who languish in prisons unnecessarily.

The Address by the Guest was followed by a flurry of questions which were duly answered by him. This made the Session of FDP highly interesting and inter-active.

The Second Session commenced with a Welcome Note for the Resource Person, **Prof. (Dr). Nishtha Jaswal, Vice Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh National Law University**, by Ms Sanjum Bedi, who apprised the participants with the vast experience and academic excellence of the Guest. Dr. Nishtha began her address with her own composed Hindi poem explaining 'what a woman is'. She stated that violence against women is a universal problem and even though we have ample of legal procedures set to curtail this evil, it is the mindset of

the society that needs to be improved. She also mentioned some statistical data regarding crime against women and said that this problem will keep on increasing until and unless we make sure that a woman is safe in her own home before we worry about the safety of a woman walking on the road because 'charity begins at home'. She recited a Sanskrit Shloka from Manusmriti, "*Yatra naryastupujyante, ramantetatra Devata, yatra itaastunapujyante, sarvaastatrafalaahkriyaah*" which means, 'where women are honoured, divinity blossoms there, and where women are dishonoured, all action no matter how noble remain unfruitful'. She commented that today's society where crime against women is mushrooming, gives a completely opposite picture than what has been depicted in the shloka. She said that many ingrained dogmas, rudimentary thinking and

stereotypical cultural narratives are responsible for the devastating plight of the women in the country.

Dr. Nishtha said that while we worship Goddesses in India but pray for a son rather than a daughter. Talking about a woman's Right to Dignity, she quoted various important Articles from the Constitution of India such as **Article 14, 15(3), 21** and cited some important judgements of landmark cases such as: *The Chairman, Railway Board and others v Mrs Chandrima Das and others AIR 2000 SC 98, (2000) 2 SCC 465, Suchita Srivastava & Anr vs Chandigarh Administration civil*

*appeal NO.5845 OF 2009, Devika Biswas v. Union of India (2016) 10 SCC 726, Ramakant Rai & anr. vs. Union of India & ors, Writ Petition (Civil) No. 209/2003, Justice K.S. Puttaswamy (Retd) vs Union Of India Writ Petition (civil) no. 494 of 2012. Further, ma'am elaborated that Judiciary played a very significant role in protecting women's rights. She said that cases like *Air India v Nargesh Meerza* have proved that the trend of Judiciary has been observed as inclining towards supporting the women to get rid of the vicious circle of vulnerability. Dr Jaswal said females in most parts of the country do not have reproductive rights and pointed out that not only female foeticide but female infanticide is also a grave problem in the country. She threw light on the rights of women in the cases of unwanted pregnancies. She explained that women in India can now terminate unwanted pregnancies, regardless of their marital status; earlier the law specified that only a "married woman and her husband" could do this. However, the law does not grant women complete control over reproductive choices or abortion. She opined that Right to Abortion is a species of Right to Privacy, which is again proclaimed as a continuance of the **Right to Life under Article 21**.*

She discussed various Offences against women which happen because of male dominance in the society.

Referring to yet another Sanskrit shlok "*adākṣiṇyaṁ virūpāmapi striyāmbhūṣayati, surūpāmapi adākṣiṇyaṁ dūṣayati*", associated with womanhood, and said that woman is strong to fight against the evils in the society because woman do not need to be empowered as they are already empowered. Women need to realise this. She said that it is very shocking that only after the case of *Laxmi v UOI*, Supreme Court issued Guidelines on Acid Attack Cases for mitigating such cases. She also gave a critical analysis of the **Criminal Amendment Act, 2013 with respect to Acid Attack**.

She also delivered her thoughts about the profession of Prostitution and gave a short critical analysis of Immoral Trafficking Protection Act. She said the Judiciary has been fair enough in declaring that

Prostitution is not an offence because it is just a means of livelihood. She showed her concern on the changing concept of Obscenity. She gave examples of some rebellious women who had faced tough times like 'Phoolan Devi' and also gave a glaring example of 'Roop Kanwar' who sacrificed her life in the name of dignity.

She concluded her address by reciting yet another self-composed Hindi poem titled '**Bandagi Kar E Bande Meri Us Khuda k Baad**', narrating a woman's who desire of being respected and treated well.

The address by the Guest was followed by a very interactive questions which was duly answered by ma'am.

Vote of Thanks

In the end, Mr. Pranshul Pathak recited a small Hindi poem written by him for Dr. Nishtha complementing her for the fantastic lecture she had delivered. Subsequently, Maj. Gen. P.K. Sharma, Professor and Director ALS winded up the Session by giving concluding remarks. He said that Laws alone are not sufficient for maintaining the safety of women in any country but it is the thought process and the mindset that needs to be diagnosed. He said that Gender Neutrality can be obtained only when women elevate their self-worth in their own minds by breaking the shackles, they are chained to. He thanked Dr. Nishtha Jaswal for illuminating and igniting the minds of the participants with her elaborate and thought-provoking address.

The Third Session of the FDP was assigned to the Topic, **Crime against Children: Issues, Challenges and Prospective** with a Welcome Address by Dr Archna Sehrawat, Assistant Professor, to the esteemed Guest of the day, **Dr Manoj Kumar Sharma, Assistant Professor, Rajiv Gandhi**

National University of Law, Maj. Gen. PK Sharma(Retd), Professor & Director, Amity Law School and Dean Faculty of Law and all the other participants.

Dr Manoj Kumar Sharma conducted the Session with an exhaustive PPT containing very useful data. He started the Session by introducing the topic and stating that crimes against children are hugely neglected on various platforms. He mentioned that these crimes are not new to the society and have been taken into consideration by our Constitution framers at the time of framing the Constitution of



India as they incorporated various protective framework for children, like Articles 15(3), 21, 21A, 23, 24, 39(e & f) and 45. Dr Sharma addressed various offences against children like kidnapping, sexual offences, child marriage and child labour. He shared data regarding offences against children. With the aid of statistics shared for different crimes, he highlighted the changing issues and challenges faced by authorities when dealing with such matters. Dr Sharma discussed various reasons for such situation of child victimisation, e.g. tardy enforcement of laws, poverty and illiteracy, lack of awareness, unemployment and societal attitude, etc. He mentioned that family and society have a crucial part to play in the victimization of children and how they impact the mental and emotional state of a child. He also mentioned that the current pandemic has contributed to the rise in offences against children and shared verified data regarding this with the participants.

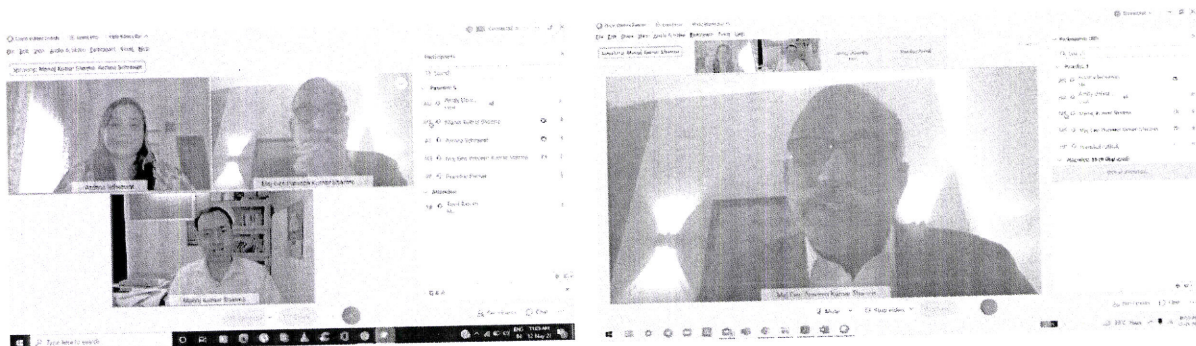
Dr Manoj highlighted the legal framework for the protection of children in India and elaborated on various provisions for the same under Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act,2012; Bonded Labour (Abolition) Act, 1976; Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006; Child Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986; Commission for Protection of Child Rights Act, 2005; Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 and IPC. Then he discussed various executive measures taken by the Government for the protection of children like, National Charterfor Children,2003; National Policy for Children,2013; National Plan of Action for Children: Safe Children, Happy Childhood,2016.



Dr Manoj elaborated on how various practices in investigating, collecting evidence and implementing the law, have contributed to the victimisation of children against various offences.

After this, he moved into addressing the queries from participants. At the end of the session, Dr

Sharma gave various suggestions for the betterment of child victimisation. He mentioned that some steps to ensure speedy trials, a strong mechanism to address and tackle offences against children, better forensic evidencing, could help in the improvement of child victimisation. He also emphasised upon media to play a better role in spreading awareness about such crimes and by adopting protective framework in family and society, the situation could be improved. He explained how changes in several social situations like poverty elevation could work for the benefit of the justice system.

The Session concluded with a Vote of Thanks proposed by Maj. Gen. P.K. Sharma (Retd.), Professor & Director Amity School of Law, Dean Faculty of Law, who thanked Dr Manoj Kumar Sharma for his insightful and interactive session. He agreed with Dr Manoj that with the help of awareness and education, offences against children could be reduced. Maj. Gen. Sharma hoped that participants must have benefited greatly from the FDP.

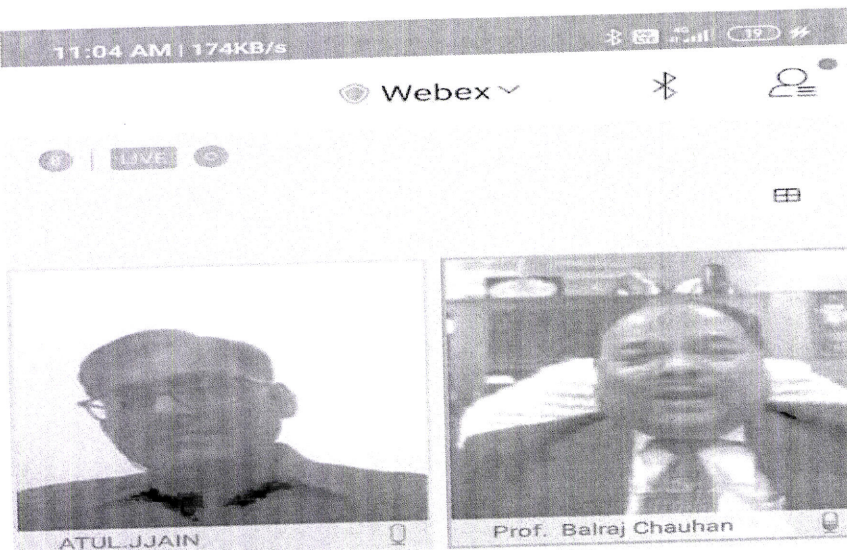

The Fourth Session of the FDP was assigned to the Topic, “Protection of Rights of Victims in Criminal Justice System”. The Session began with a Welcome Address by Mr Atul Jain, Associate

Professor, wherein he extended a warm welcome to the esteemed Guest of the day, **Prof.(Dr) Balraj Chauhan, Vice Chancellor, Dharamshastra National University of Law, Jabalpur**, Maj. Gen. PK Sharma, Professor & Director, Amity Law School and Dean Faculty of Law and all the participants.

Prof (Dr) Balraj Chauhan began the Session by referring to the Malimath Committee Report, 2003 which had commented that the existing criminal justice system was too centred on the accused and

the victim was only called upon to give evidence. The Committee recommended revamping the system, many of which revolved around guaranteeing justice to the victims of crime. This could have achieved by making provisions allowing the victim to actively participate in cases



involving serious crimes as well as ensuring adequate compensation.

He referred to Victimology, the branch of Criminology that scientifically studies the relationship between an injured party and an offender. He stated that Victimology first emerged in the 1940s and 50s, when several criminologists (notably Hans von Hentig, Benjamin Mendelsohn, and Henri Ellenberger) examined victim-offender interactions and stressed reciprocal influences and role reversals. He mentioned about the Declaration of Basic Principles of Justice for Victims of Crime and Abuse of Power, adopted by the United Nations in 1985, which outlines international best practices for treatment of crime victims. The Declaration recognizes an offender's obligation to make fair restitution to his or her victim, acknowledges that victims are entitled to fair treatment and access to the mechanisms of justice. He referred to various Case Laws and Landmark judgements of the Supreme Court of India dealing with the concept of

While referring to the Criminal Justice System in India, he referred to the book "Indian Legal System: Can it be Saved", authored by Fali S. Nariman and quoted therefrom, "The Indian system of justice is British and so adversarial, unfriendly to all the traces of rustic dispute mechanism that had originally taken root in Bharat or Hindustan." He praised the Supreme Court of India for breaking the shackles of Sovereign Immunity stated under Art 300 of the Constitution and fixed State's liability in cases like Rudul Shah, Bhim Singh, Nilabati Behera etc.

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Directorate of Outcome

He discussed about the provisions available in the Indian Legal System relating to protection of victim's rights. He referred to the definition of Victim provided in Sec 2(wa) of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1973, Motor Vehicles Act, SC/ST Act and various provisions enumerated in the Constitution as well as in CrPC for the protection of rights of victim particularly Sections 357 A and 24(8). He stated that main rights relating to victims are, Access to Justice and Fair Treatment, Restitution, Compensation and Legal Assistance.

He concluded the address by suggesting that there should be proper provisions for settling norms for monetary compensation and restitution, sensitising law enforcement agencies, a responsive and responsible society and collective action by all. He said that while there are a lot of Schemes made by various States under the Legal Services Act which need to be explored by Law Students and work upon their proper implementation. There are very good provisions under this Act for awarding compensation to Victims.

This was followed by Question-Answer Session where Prof Chauhan replied to the queries raised by the participants.

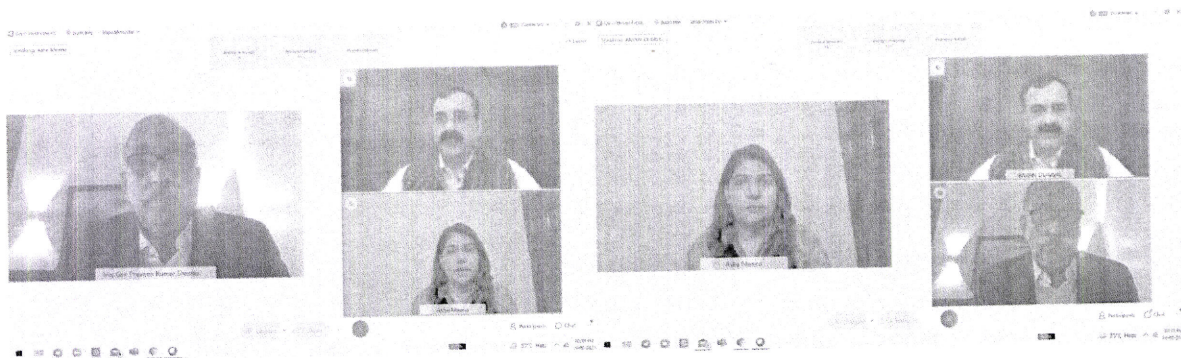

Topic:- "Changing Facets of Corporate Crimes in Cyber Age."

The Fifth Session was addressed by Dr. Pavan Duggal, Advocate, Supreme Court of India Founder-cum Chancellor, Cyber law University on the Sub-Theme: **“Changing Facets of Corporate Crimes in Cyber Age”**, who elaborated on the new emerging trends of cybercrimes.



The Session began with a Welcome Address delivered by Ms. Asha Meena, Assistant Professor, Amity Law School, who introduced the Guest and thanked him for accepting the invite to address the Faculty Members.

Dr. Pavan Duggal began his address quoting the phenomenal global loss that has been faced in the Cyber Law industry due to the pandemic. He mentioned that due to Covid-19, the kinds of crimes and their mutants have become diverse and it will not be wrong to term this as the “golden age” of Cyber-Crime. There are two kinds of people, according to Dr. Duggal, first the ones who believe or know that they are hacked and the others who don't have any idea about it. Recently, a new trend has been observed in Cyber world where the students have started experimenting with different Cyber Crimes out of curiosity and end up behind Bars. He stressed upon the fact that ignorance of Law is no excuse. One should know all the provisions pertaining to their requirement.

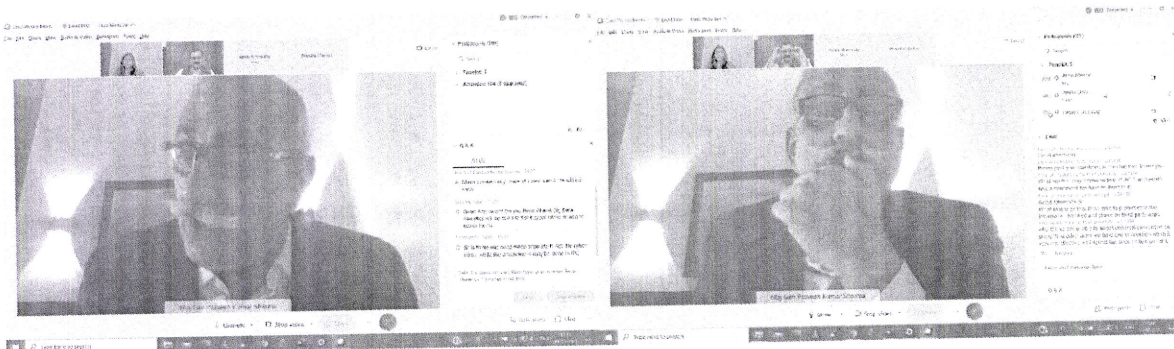
Further, as Dr. Duggal mentioned, it is shocking rather than surprising that there are no International Cyber Security Laws. It is a complete vacuum on policy relating to Cyber Space. On National front however, the Government has announced National Security Directives on Telecom Sector for secure networks which means all the activities are being scanned. Furthermore, WORK FROM HOME has not helped in curbing Cyber Crimes as it has brought new challenges and Indians are falling prey to these Cyber-attacks.

In addition to this, Dr Duggal emphasized on the fact that we cannot live without technology. Whether it is the robotics market, cloud computing, blockchain, bitcoins, cryptocurrency, one cannot follow the ostrich approach. Machine learning and artificial intelligence together open new areas of learning and gaining knowledge. As ‘internet of things’ and internet of behaviour give a fertile platform for Cyber Crimes, they need to be regulated in order to protect the data. In India, the Information Technology Act was enforced with the intention of imposing Intermediary Liability so that due diligence could be practiced so as to ensure compliance with relevant parameters. The Act

has been amended once in 2008, wherein few provisions were amended and few like Section 66A were declared unconstitutional by the Apex Court.

Dr Duggal concluded his Session by amalgamating Cyber Law with the message given by Lord Krishna in Bhagwat Geeta. Lord Krishna asks Arjun to come to his sharan (asylum) and he will protect him. Similarly, Cyber Law has the same statutory message that one should follow the Law and there is no reason one could ever be put behind the Bars. Due to the changing paradigms, it is the need of the hour that we stay ready to welcome the change and comply with Law.

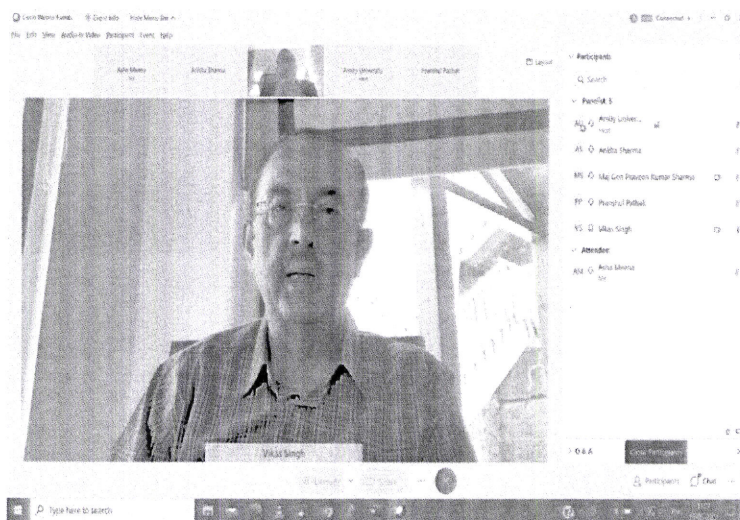
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The Sixth Session of the Faculty Development Programme (FDP) was on the Sub-Theme, **“Protection of Witnesses- A Need of the Hour”** that was addressed by **Mr Vikas Singh, President of the Supreme Court Bar Association**. The Session began with a Welcome Address by Dr Ankita Sharma, Assistant Professor, Amity Law School, wherein she extended a warm welcome to the esteemed Guest of the day, Mr Vikas Singh, Senior Advocate Supreme Court of India, President of Supreme Court Bar Association and Maj. Gen. PK Sharma, Professor & Director, Amity Law School and Dean Faculty of Law and all the other participants of the FDP.

Mr Singh started the Session by extending his gratitude towards Maj. Gen. PK Sharma, Professor & Director, Amity Law School and Dean Faculty of Law and Amity University for inviting him for the Session. Identifying it as a global concern, Mr. Singh addressed the issue of Witness Protection by providing various examples from his own experience and discussed the seriousness of Protection of Witnesses in India. He highlighted the Supreme Court Guidelines of 2018 on Witness Protection and mentioned that the Legislature needs to provide a legal framework in order to support the Criminal Justice System of India. He said that the issue of Witness Protection



has to be seen in context with Police Reforms and Legislators with criminal antecedents.

Mr Singh said that there can be three types of Crimes, viz, -(a) By Gangsters, (b) By accused having political links and (c) Normal disputes. The issue of Protection to Witnesses normally arises in crimes as at (a) and (b) above. There can also be instances where witness may set up innocent persons as accused. Hence, we have to understand as to who really is a witness who would need protection.

Mr Vikas Singh stated that the vulnerability of witnesses and the lack of Police Reforms in the country is the real cause behind witnesses turning hostile. He mentioned that witnesses are regarded as one of the most indispensable element in the Criminal Justice System and it is because of them, that the trial finds some substance so as to arrive at a fair conclusion. The inputs provided by witnesses may have direct bearing on the conviction or acquittal of an accused and hence, it is desired that such witnesses be protected from the wrath of extraneous factors that have the capability to change their stance over a particular case. He emphasized on the importance of Police Reforms in India and further, mentioned that it is also the responsibility of civil society to provide a safe environment to witnesses to lead to justice.

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Mr Vikas Singh then spoke about a large number of Legislators who get elected despite criminal background. The system needs to be clear on this issue as who can contest Elections and Political Parties should also ensure that they field Candidates with clean record.

The address by Mr Vikas Singh was followed by a number of questions put to him by the participants, which were duly replied by him.

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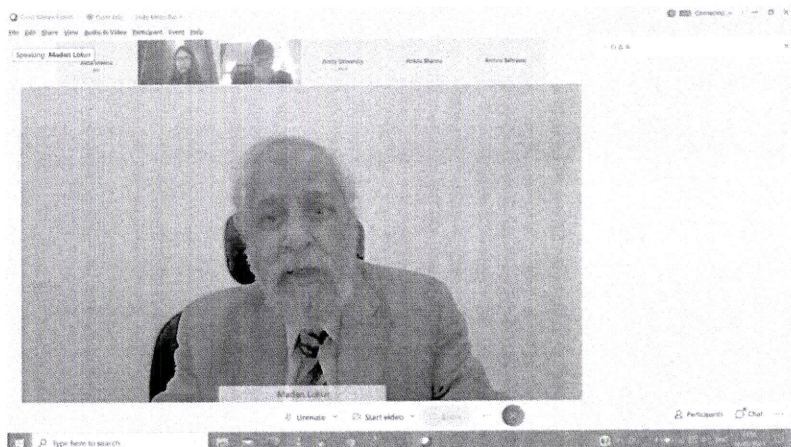
The last and Seventh Session of the FDP was on the Topic, **“The Role of the Judiciary in upholding the mandate of the Criminal Justice System”**, which was addressed by **Hon’ble Mr. Justice Madan Lokur, Former Judge of the Supreme Court of India.**



The Session began with a Welcome Address delivered by Ms. Toshi Rattan, Assistant Professor, Amity Law School, who introduced the Guest to the participants and thanked him for accepting the invite to address the gathering.

Lordship started by pointing out the three elements of a Criminal Justice System viz Victim, Accused and the Society. Sir, elaborated that judiciary have to play a pivotal role by balancing their conflicting interest. It is the supreme authority responsible to punish the violators of fundamental rights and civil liberties for doing complete justice, being a custodian and protector of Constitution and Fundamental Rights.

Justice Lokur focused on the importance of fairness in justice which is ensured not just through cases brought before the Courts but also where the Courts act suo moto. He explained this by citing the recent example wherein the Delhi High Court got involved and directed the State Government to fulfil the need of Oxygen Concentrators in Delhi.



Talking about the pendency of trials, Hon’ble Mr Justice Madan Lokur emphasised the importance of expeditious trials for several reasons- to protect the rights of the victim, to make sure the witness does not turn hostile, to ensure that the victim and the witness are duly protected (especially in the absence of a proper law for Witness/ Victim protection). By illustrating these factors, he explained how Justice Delayed is Justice Denied.

Lordship elaborated on how the Judiciary plays an important role in the administration of an efficient Criminal Justice System. The Judiciary’s task is not only to punish the accused of a crime but also to make sure that the victim and the society at large are benefitted from its actions. The Judiciary has to see things in a broader perspective. The punishment prescribed by the Courts could be reformative, rehabilitative, deterrent or retributive and it cannot be put in a box since each case is

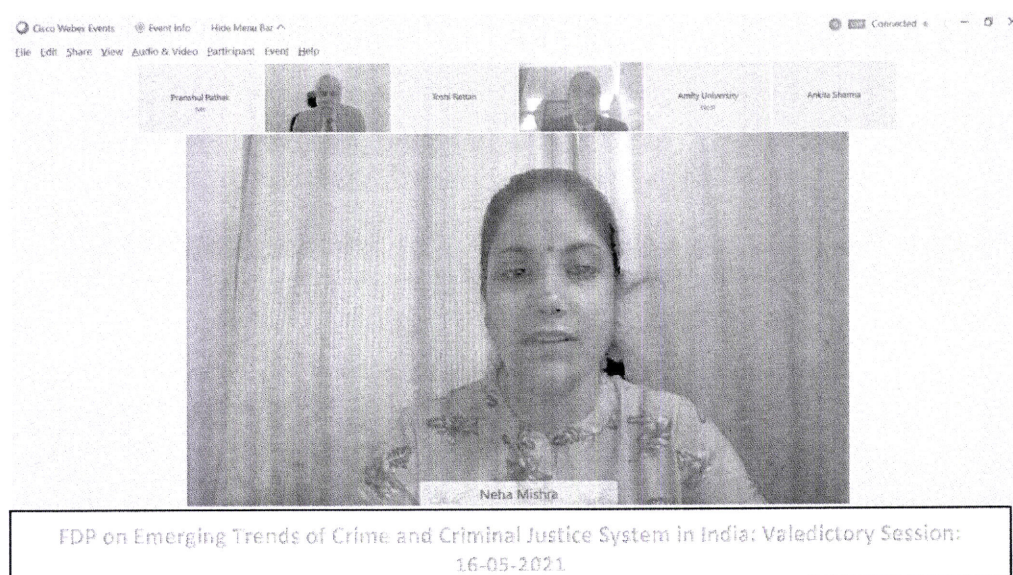
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different. At the end, Sir alleged that the Draconian law like **National Security Act** and **Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act** which is being diligently misused should stop.

The discourse was followed by Question-Answer Session, via chat box, which turned out to be an interesting and interactive part of the Session.

On a query raised, Lordship mentioned that he is personally disappointed with the Criminal Justice System of India for two particular reasons: first, being the pendency of trials and second, the overcrowding of prisons. Here, he pointed out that as much as 59% of under trials in the prisons and 3 lakh pending applications of bail.
