To Integrate all these as one in a hand-crafted recycled sustainable technique is the final theme using Chindi and indigenous hand-spun khadi.

The first theme Chitra-Varnan by Aksshaya Venkat explores Kalamkari art on Silk with a unique combination of hand-crafted leather styled with basket -weaving and laser-cutting. The Greco-Bohemian look is epitomized in ecstatic rustle of silk with the demure leather. Ankita Aggarwal and Divya Karan translate their love for Indigo-printed Ajrakh with the delicate embroidery of Chikankari in Kashish. Amalgamation of the two stalwart handicrafts in Hi-Street ensembles creates an attractive anthology. Punar-Kala is elite resort wear unleashing the sustainable handcraft of recycling textiles. This theme is the designer Sejal Thakur's interpretation to distinguish and merge Chindi a labour of love of native Maharashtra & indigenous hand spun Khadi to create a unique brand of style. Nishabd is where fabrics and structures speak for themselves. Oversized Avant-Garde androgynous ensembles in the finest Fulwar jamdani with 3-D Kirigami accordion pleats create a bold and emphatic style. The chosen silhouettes push the boundaries of what is accepted as the norm.

Traditional Textiles Workshops - Rabari Embroidery

Gujarat! The name itself gives us a crystal-clear picture of a world full of colours, designs, embroideries and mirror work. One of the most famous embroidery is the

Rabari embroidery of Kutch. It majorly works with chain stitches and extraordinary mirror-work. School of Fashion Design and Technology organized this traditional embroidery workshop in coordination with Ms. Raniben Rabari from Kutch. She explained the origin of and techniques in Rabari Embroidery. Raniben hails from Rabari community, a nomadic / semi-nomadic community of western region of India, from Rajasthan to the Kutch region in Gujarat, the wandering gypsies. Rabari, or "Rahabari" means one who lives outside or "goes out of the path". By the end of the twentieth century, Rabari embroidery started to get recognized by its use of mirrors (shisha) surrounded by colorful embroidery. Rabari mythology and their desert habitation have been an inspiration for many of the large and bold designs. They work on individual motifs being outlined with chain stitch and then filled in with buttonhole stitch and herringbone stitch, all in brightly colored threads. In addition, back stitch (bakhiya) is used to decorate the seams of women's blouses and on men's jackets (kediyun). The workshop stimulated the students' imaginations on how these crafts can be put into today's contemporary designs.

Traditional Textiles Workshops

ASFDT believes in inculcating creativity skills by keeping a sync between modern designing techniques and traditional arts. With this in view, regular workshops with 'paramparikkarigars' from different states of India areorganised for students.

A recent workshop was organized on Pattachitraor Palm Leaf Etching of Odisha.

Mr. Narayan Das, artisan practicing Pattachitrawas invited from Odisha to conduct this workshop. He explained the history behind the art and its significance, before paper was invented, people used to write and draw on palm leaves with stylus made of twigs sharpened with rocks to give the effect of a fine tip pen. Interestingly, all the Hindu books, like The Ramayana and the Mahabharata, The Vedas and The Upanishads and other mythological stories were all written on palm leaves.

The process of preparing the leaf as a canvas to etching and creating the design was demonstrated and students got the opportunity to learn it hands-on on preprocessed leaves provided by the artist. Samples of Pattachitra were also distributed for reference. The detailing of art and execution of design on the leaves was a rare experience of creativity and understanding our traditional crafts.
