Brief Course Description:	In this module, students will investigate the legal framework of Human Rights embedded in the Constitution of India and of the United Nations as well as regional systems relating to the protection and promotion of, inter alia, the rights of minorities and indigenous peoples, women's rights, the rights of migrants and refugees, cultural rights, and the emerging field of environmental rights. Students will assess the remedies that exist for violations of human rights law in the various systems and examine practical case studies wherever relevant. This course provides a platform through which students can explore international human rights norms thematically The course is organized in four modules, beginning with a survey of the conceptual and historical origins of human rights and how it evolved through the Constitution of India and the national regime designed to protect them. Then, we will examine the evolution of Human Rights in International perspective, its patterns and explanations for human rights violations over time and space. Next module will deal with the problems in public and private domain. The last module will include the study of international regime with the right to development and international trade and human rights. We will conclude by studying variety of solutions that have been offered to protect human rights at national as well as international level.
