Drawing parallels between the child and the seed, he stated that the care, the support system that is provided nurtures the child to evolve into a citizen who is not just an individual but a social being. He stressed that critical perspective, where a learner could learn to think for themselves required to be enhanced and collaborative spaces required to be encourage. He concluded by stating that this webinar could be seen as initiation or stepping stones towards identifying the democratic values and inculcation.

CONNECTING THROUGH CREATIVITY

Creative ways to connect with learners

Workshop organised by Amity Institute of "Connecting Education on through creativity". where esteemed guest Ms. Gayatri Natarajan, Co-Founder and Head of Curriculum at Learning Curve Foundation, Hyderabad. explained in nuance the responsibility of the teacher to develop readiness in the students for learning. It builds their intrinsic motivation and the teaching learning process becomes effortless.





She talked about the difference between teaching concepts or teaching student. According to her if the teacher is preparing to teach the students, then he/she should prepare the concept in such way that а it is understandable and reliable to students. Talking about the individual differences among the learner the teacher should foster inclusivity classroom in environment and develop sensitivity towards different needs of learners.

Teachers spend more time with students than their parents, hence teachers must be extra careful towards what they say and do around students as these things have great impact on the learners. Ms. Gayatri conducted many activities to demonstrate different types of creative activities which could be implemented in classroom.

They will inculcate skills in students such as critical thinking, creativity, attention observation, focus, etc.




21st Century Skills for Teachers

Focus on developing 21st century skill in teachers

Amity Institute of Education organized a webinar on "21st Century Skills & Human Teacher". The event was graced by Mr. Ved Kumar Mishra, Principal, DPS, Bareilly, as speaker. He talked about the shift in the teaching-learning process from instructional to experiential learning, project based and hands-on learning. Elaborating upon 21st century skills, he explained the three branches namely Learning Skills, Life Skills & Literacy Skills.



He stressed upon the KASH Approach (Knowledge, Attitudes, Skills and Habits), which every teacher develop must for effectiveness. He by concluded emphasising the need to become a human



teacher rather than mechanical. A human teacher with her brain and her heart is more effective than any computer teaching students. Values such ลร compassion, understanding , empathy, commitment, dedication, love, and sympathy sets her apart from others. He believes that every teacher should aspire to be an enabler rather than limiting herself to being an involver or explainer.




Applications like Audacity, Open shot video editor, stop motion Animation and Easely.ly were taught to them on the basis of which innovative and informational projects were developed by the students
